ORANGE COUNTY.

The Non-Partisan Convention Nominates a Complete Ticket.

SANTA ROSA, July 2.—An enthusiastic Non-Partisan Convention assembled at Spurgeon's Hall at 10 o'clock this morning. Eighty delegates were in attendance. Committees on Organization, Resolutions and Credentials were appointed. After a temporary organization it adjourned until 1 o'clock.

Voting by precincts upon candidates commenced at 1:30. The following nominations were made: Mayor, Wm. J. Wilson, 58 years of age, killed his companion, called "Crazy Joe," by cutting his throat and afterward blowing the top of his head off with a shotgun. The murderer gave himself up, and was brought to the county jail near midnight.

When the Associated Press correspondent saw Wilson this morning he learned the following story:

It appears that the murderer and his victim had been drinking wine together on Charles Johnson's ranch up in the canyon, and both had been carousing two or three days until they were on the verge of delirium tremens or some other satanic aberration of the mind, when a quarrel ensued. "Crazy Joe" then drew a revolver, whereupon the latter rambled at him with an open knife, but intended only to cut Joe in the face, and a delivery wagon for the neck and cut his throat in front to produce death. Joe cried out in his agonies for Wilson to kill him quick.

Wilson, with the cry of the intensest passion, walked deliberately to the house, where he procured a shotgun and came back to the dying victim, and placing the muzzle between the contorted and blood-stained face, fired, the charge blew the anterior portion of the skull in fragments.

After the deed was committed Wilson asked Charles Johnson to go for a Canby, before the constable could arrive Wilson became impatient and walked toward Glen Ellen, and meeting two men asked them to bring him to Santa Rosa.

SAN FRANCISCO NOTES.

Legs Crushed at the Ferry Landing—The Federated Trades—Etc.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 2.—A. J. Jahnholz, a deck-hand on the ferry boat Piedmont, met with a serious accident this morning while crossing East street. He got in between a hotel bus and a delivery wagon for the Albany Brewery, and was otherwise knocked down or fell to the ground, the wheels of the brewery wagon passing over his legs. He was removed to the County Hospital, where it was found that he had suffered a sprain of the right ankle and a fracture of the left leg. Jahnholz resides with his family in Berkeley.

SEVEN MONTHS IN THE HOUSE.

NEVADA COUNTY.

A Falling Off in the Assessed Value of Property—Hot Weather.

NEVADA, July 2.—John Anderson, a fourteen-year-old colored lad, was bound over to the United States District Court for stealing sheep. The two white boys, still younger, who were arrested with Anderson, were bound over to the same court, but there being no evidence connecting them with the crime.

This was the warmest day of the season, the thermometer indicating ninety-four in the shade.

The first assessment roll of Nevada county for this year foots up \$5,688,765, being a falling off of \$17,840 from last year.

Grass values in Grass Valley and Rough and Ready townships have declined, owing to the increased areas devoted to agriculture and horticulture. All the other townships have declined, owing to the depreciation of the suspension of hydraulic mining claims and the consequent injury to gravel claims and connecting water rights.

VOLO FILE.

One of Webb Curtis' Wheat Fields Destroyed—Other Losses.

WOODLAND, July 2.—This morning a fire started on Webb Curtis' ranch, near Wright Landing, and by the dropping of some of them from a traction engine which was being used to run a combined road and water line, and by the falling of a section of wheat belonging to Mr. Curtis. About one thousand tons of hay and straw were destroyed by the fire, and the wheat was insured for \$100,000. Most of the wheat was insured, but not for the property belonging to George Dinsdale, Thomas Langford and J. M. Mannell. The damage is estimated at \$100,000.

Another Added to the Long List of Los Angeles' Fire Victims.

LANCASTER (Cal.) July 2.—Bill Tweedy, a cattle man, left Lancaster at 1 p. m., went to Maynard, ten miles west, and stopped at a place where he was to pick up his wife. He was driving a horse-drawn wagon, and was struck by a train in the middle of the back and on his left side. The doctor succeeded in pulling the bullet out, but could not find the other. Internal hemorrhage set in, and Tweedy died in great agony at 2:28 p. m. He was a well-to-do man, and was married to a woman who has a young child. The body was taken to the Los Angeles City Jail.

NARROW ESCAPE.

How Two Fishermen Lost All Their Appetite for Aquatic Sport.

SAN DIEGO, July 2.—J. M. Lucas, a well-known attorney of this city, and Captain Edward Friend had a narrow escape from drowning at Del Mar. They went out on a rock to fish at low tide and stayed so long that the water was too deep to wade in when they thought of returning, and they were unable to swim through the breakers. The waves broke over the rock incessantly, and the only way they kept themselves afloat was by washing out to sea by eddies, drifting desperately to a crevice until 2 o'clock this morning, when the water receded. They were badly upset, and their appetites for fishing is entirely gone.

Sterling, who was also adopted by Fix. No criminal proceedings have yet been instituted.

Suicide of a Crazy Man.

TRUCON (A. T.), July 2.—Pablo Rebel, who claimed to have been arrested and robbed by Mexican bandits a few days ago, outside of the city, today committed suicide by shooting himself in the mouth, the bullet coming out at the top of his head. He left a letter for District Attorney Ford retracting all he had said in charging Bonco Flores with having committed the deed. He said he could not remember anything he did that night. The general supposition is that he was delirious from the effects of drink. He shot his own horse thinking some man was attacking him.
