DISTRIBUTING POINTS.

The Short-Sighted Position Taken by Boston and Chicago.

(From the San Francisco Call.) Boston and Chicago are inclined to regard Canadian competition as an unmixed benefit.

The same view of the situation. These authorities imagine it is a benefit to our people to have a foreign road take business from American roads by doing it at less than cost.

This is all the hold the Canadian Pacific has. Being possessed of a subsidy that covers a large part of the operating expenses, the Canadian road can transport its products from one American city to another at less than cost.

It may be well to look into the future and see what will happen if the American roads would charge for the same goods. The lower cost of transportation apparently enables Boston to remain the distributing point for a larger area of territory than it would be able to do without some advantage.

But there is no law, either of trade or of books, which fixes the area of territory which a city may be the distributing point. The Canadian road is under no obligation to carry goods to Boston to be hauled back two or three hundred miles.

Distributing points may be established along the road west of Boston as the Canadian road may deem advantageous. It is often said that statute laws cannot greatly influence nature. But in this transportation route has natural advantages over another, and the route having the natural advantages cannot be set aside by an act of law-making power.

But in this transportation problem the essential condition is cheapness. The route that can do business at the lowest rates will get the business to do. The subsidy the Canadian road enjoys enables it to do the business that might be done by either at lower rates than the American roads, being unsubsidized, can do.

The same advantage will enable the Canadian road to build up distributing points along its lines from which to supply the American territory now supplied by Chicago and Boston. The only remedy is to enforce against the Canadian road the laws which, applied to ocean and river transportation, rule out the foreign carrier.
