OAKLAND RACES. Nina D. Wins the Unfinished Race - The Field Pools Win.

OAKLAND, September 10th. - The Park this morning the deciding heat in yesterday's unfinished trotting race were trotted. WASHINGTON, September 10th. - Telegrams to-night from New York, Boston, Wilkesbarre, and in fact from all points along the Atlantic coast state that they are along the coast the heaviest storm ever experienced in the recollection of the oldest inhabitant. Many lives have been lost and millions of property destroyed. All the pleasure resorts along the coast are wrecked. To add to all the other horrors they have had a severe earthquake in Pennsylvania, which has ruined many coal mines.
