Belmont, the Millionaire Turfman, Fires Snapper Garrison.

CHICAGO, September 19th.—A special from New York says: Sporting circles received quite a shock yesterday in the announcement that Snapper Garrison had been discharged by millionaire Belmont for alleged bad riding. As the story goes, trainer Rowe of Belmont's stable had a million on Tuesday that Raedland was in superb condition and it was the original intention to start him in the Belmont race on Wednesday. Belmont, however, had finished ninth and had been favorite. After the race was run, Belmont, hot over his horse, and, after a long conference with Rowe had told him the truth about Raedland's condition, caught Garrison in the act of tampering with the horse's things. DANVILLE BANK.

Second Trial of General Lester B. Faulkner for Stealing.

BUFFALO, September 19th.—The second trial of General Lester B. Faulkner, charged with wrecking the Danville National Bank, was begun in the United States District Court before Judge Cox this morning. Wm. B. Hoyt, D. N. Lockwood, assistant United States attorneys, were on the stand.

General Hoyt, of Washington, who has been connected with the Treasury as Examiner of the National Banks for the past twenty-five years, identified several Danville Bank reports.

James M. Donald, Cashier of the Hanover National Bank of New York, filed on May 31, 1887, the amount of indebtedness on the Danville National Bank, which was \$75,347, and on the United States National Bank, which was \$100,000, just previous to the failure, was \$18,380 on discount paper and \$100,000 on temporary loans. The witness went to Danville and saw Faulkner, who showed him the property and the mortgage on the property which was acceptable, but he made no reply as to how he communicated with the Government officials in regard to the matter.

CHICAGO'S SENSATION.

The Le Cronin Letter Laughed at by the Attorneys in the Case.

CHICAGO, September 19th.—All the morning papers denounce yesterday's sensational story about Le Cronin's daughter having furnished evidence that Dr. Cronin was embezzler. The British Government is the plot of the so-called trouble, to the benefit of the prisoners now on trial. His agents out letters to the States in evidence, and even if they were, it would not effect the evidence against the prisoners, going to show their connection with the plot.

The motion for the discharge of Frank Woodruff, an indictment for conspiracy to murder Dr. Cronin, was brought before Judge McConnell in the Criminal Court this afternoon. The application was made on the ground that the statutory time within which the accused was entitled to his trial had expired. The matter went over till to-morrow.

When the Court was called after recess it was understood the attorney for Woodruff, James H. Wills & Co., had passed a motion for a discharge of his client on the ground that the statutory time under which he was entitled to his trial had expired.

The States' attorney also said to the Court that Woodruff is also held for homicide on the charge of shooting a man named Crozier, and the case was continued until the next term.

In addition, on his motion this case was continued until the next term, by consent, on his own showing.

The Court has the whole of this term to go over the case, and it is believed that the States' attorney will not be able to show good cause. The matter was set for hearing to-morrow afternoon.

No more murders were secured to-day.
