

DESTRUCTION OF TIMBER.

THE STATE BOARD OF FORESTRY MEMORIALS CONGRESS. Temporary Report of the Timber Entry Law Urged—The Great Need of Surveys.

The following memorial from the California State Board of Forestry was presented in the United States Senate yesterday. To the people of the United States inhabiting the so-called arid districts, or those States and Territories which are largely arid or only partially fertile, there is no single memorial which so profoundly affects their material welfare as that of the timber supply.

Recent investigations by the Senatorial Aid Committee have resulted in phenomenal benefits to people fortunate enough to come into the scope of its operation. The vast area of the Sacramento-San Joaquin valley, which has been so long and so rapidly being opened up to settlement and profitable occupation, chiefly through the agency of the railroad and canal systems, is the more southern end of the State.
