MONEY NEEDED. Supervisors Asked to Help the River Improvement Project.

At yesterday's session of the Board of Supervisors a committee from the City Board of Trade, consisting of E. K. Alsip, Wm. Ingram, Jr., and Sparrow Smith, appeared and asked the Board to make an appropriation of \$500 toward carrying out the purposes of the River Improvement Convention that has been called to meet in this city on the 27th instant.

The necessity for the appropriation was explained by Mr. Alsip. He said it would doubtless be deemed advisable by the Convention to send a delegation to Washington to lay the matter before Congress.

Supervisor Greer thought that the Board would be doing the right thing to appropriate money to send delegates to Congress if there seemed to be reasonable hope of getting Congress to undertake the work of reclaiming the river.

Supervisor Bates also spoke in favor of the proposition. He said the restoration of the river was something that should not longer be delayed.

President Ross informed the committee that the Board was unwilling to favor granting the desired assistance. The Supervisors, he said, would so far as they lawfully could promote the good work in view.
