WORKMEN ON THE OREGON DIVISION HAVE LOTS OF TROUBLE.

HEAVY LAND SLIDES. Workmen on the Oregon Division Have Lots of Trouble.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT. A Car Goes Through a Bridge and the Men are Killed.

THE DALLAS (Or.), February 3.—A gang of laborers left the Dallas on the morning of February 2, to work on the track. Early that morning the caboose went through a bridge, the engine passing safely, but the tender falling on the caboose killed five white men and badly wounded fifteen colored men.

A train with three doctors, Coroner Mitchell and Deputy Sheriff Cates left this morning at 10 o'clock with a wrecking crew to investigate the cause of the accident. The train was stopped at a point one mile and a half west of Cascade Locks, in Wasco county. The train was rendered unsafe by the late heavy rains.

The heaviest rainfall for fifteen years happened in the last two days. In thirty hours 2.58 inches of rain fell. The water in the river and all the creeks are very high. Houses in the lower part of the city are flooded. The water is so high that the less of the low part of the city is very small, and will not reach 5 feet. No communication is kept on account of washouts and slides.

LATER—the relief trains which left here at 11 o'clock yesterday arrived at Cascade Locks at 1 o'clock. The train was crowded and sixteen wounded. Two doctors walked to the wreck and rendered assistance to the men.

Mill creek bridge was saved yesterday by the indomitable bravery of Boy Wires, a locomotive engineer, in cutting the draw. The bridge was damaged so that engines cannot cross.

A boat left this morning with a crew to open a path for the train. Three trainloads of passengers are blocked.

KEEPING UP ITS RECORD. Another Murder Committed in San Francisco Yesterday.

SAN FRANCISCO, February 3.—Shortly after seven this evening, J. F. Naughton, a resident of San Francisco, was shot and killed by a man named Mark M. Herr, a solicitor for the Association, went to the Association's office in the Murphy building, and there he was shot.

He did not entertain a friendly feeling for Naughton, and he had a dispute with him. The dispute arose, and Herr threatened to eject Naughton and Brewer, and in furtherance of this threat he shot Naughton.

Everybody is inquiring about the height of the river at Sacramento and many prophesy a flood if the rain keeps up as it has to-day.

The track at Gibson is apt to be washed away if much more water comes down from the creeks. At the slide this afternoon, the water was so high that the cars were standing in water, which is flowing over the rails to a depth of several inches. In fact everything appears to be snow or water.

ALBUQUERQUE (N. M.), February 3.—Yesterday afternoon Pablo Pera shot and killed a man named Pedro Hernandez, a boy, at Bernallillo. The murderer was drunk, and passing Chavez residence he shot at a man named Hernandez.
