The President of Mills Seminary is Under a Deep Cloud. A DEDICATION AT PASADENA. A Well Known Citizen Found Dead in the Foothills of Los Angeles County—Etc.

MILLS COLLEGE.

Charges of a Serious Character Brought Against President Stratton. SAN FRANCISCO, April 13th.—Since last January the management of Mills Seminary has not been connected with complete harmony between the President, Dr. C. C. Stratton, and the faculty...

When a committee of three persons was appointed to meet on February 10th and hear the accusations from those who had made them. The committee reported to the Trustees the result of their investigation did not reflect in any manner upon the conduct of the President.

The Trustees held several meetings subsequently, and about two weeks ago, at a meeting of the Board, there being absent but two members—Mrs. Mills and James G. Fair—the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, Growing out of serious and persistent misunderstandings in the college, certain charges and counter-charges affecting the personal and professional standing of Dr. C. C. Stratton, and of other members of the faculty, have been brought to the attention of the Board; and whereas, these charges have, in the opinion of a full Board, been patiently and carefully considered.

Resolved, That in our judgment it is neither entertaining nor wise that the said charges should be proceeded upon by the Board, and that the proceedings connected with the same should be discontinued, and that the Board should be advised to discontinue the same.

Dr. Stratton was interviewed last night. He denied most emphatically that he had transcended his position as President of the college in any manner whatever. He positively denied the charges made against him, and at the same time asserted his determination to say nothing which would be detrimental to Mills College or to the teachers connected therewith.

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MORALITY AND RELIGION.
