LOANS ON FARM LANDS.

STANFORD'S PLAN OF GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE EXPLAINED.

It Will Not Interfere With the Banks and Money-Lenders, But Indirectly Benefit Them.

From the San Francisco Examiner, April 17th. To the Editor of the Examiner:—Sir: I desire to answer some objections made to Senator Stanford's plan of Government loans on farm property at a rate of interest as low as 3 per cent. or less.
