

THIRTY YEARS AGO.

REVIEW OF THE CENSUS TAKEN THIRTY YEARS BEFORE THAT.

Navigation of the Sacramento in Early Days—Old Peter Lassen's canoe—Various Local Incidents.

The first attempt at an official enumeration of the inhabitants of California, in 1850, was made in 1847, while California was Territorial Governor. It was one of the first official acts of his Secretary of State, Henry W. Halleck, at that time a Lieutenant of Engineers. The only localities from which returns were made were the valleys of the Sacramento and San Joaquin and the town of San Francisco.

A correspondent of the Union, in a letter from San Diego, dated July 7, 1890, sent some particulars thereof, together with the following review of the early history of this portion of the State:

"It was the explorer Captain Sutter, at the time of the taking of the census, and assisted in the work. As we neglected making a marine report for the Sacramento river, I give it here as the best authority as great as that of the population. The only regular packet running between the Sacramento and Yuba, was the beautiful Russian-American Company at Siskiyou for the sea other service at Bodega, and sold to Captain Sutter in 1847. It was then lying at Washington, opposite your city, in 1858, rooted over and used as a house by the non-dishers. It was coppered and copper-plated and officers and crew were by Indians—captain and six men before the mast. The entire crew was changed at every trip, and it was not a pound of freight to go down, but it was the only way to get to the mouth of the river, and the only papers were quite fresh as when they were more than a month old.
