THE DAY.

There is neither necessity nor excuse for long dwelling upon the event this day ushers in. In plain words, it is the State's birthday, and it is to be celebrated, as it has been during forty years, as a joyous anniversary.

Only this year the generation that trod upon the heels of "Admission" takes a more than usually active part in the exercises.

It is a right and proper thing to do. We have not any too many holidays, not too many days when the tension of business and labor can be relaxed. Moreover, it is a good thing, a most commendable thing to thus celebrate local pride.

Attachment to the soil is the best foundation of loyalty to government. Love for place of birth bulwarks the homes of men, and holds them in a close relation that is a peace potentiality and a conservator of manliness, gentleness, mercy and justice.

We have not one particle of sympathy with the shallow intelligence that a few days ago attempted to fluninate against to-day's celebration by the Pioneers and Native Sons, on the ground that such action as they are taking tends to cultivate "State's rights doctrines," and to relax regard for the national compact.

All which is silly. Secession never arose, or will arise, out of any just and honorable pride of the citizen in his community.

We shall hear enough to-day of the peculiar reasons why this State's birthday should be observed with pomp and ceremony. Chiefly the reasons are that no other State has had such growth; no other State was born into the Union without passing through the probationary state of territorial government, and finally because the admission of California was a gigantic and heroic blow at the institution of human slavery, and aided in setting in motion the activities that resulted in the national policy being irrevocably declared that no new territory of the Union should be dedicated to slave labor.

Of course there is a great deal to be said about the development accomplished in California of the splendid types of young manhood and young womanhood we have known, despite the prophecy that the mildness of our climate would give us only a weak and nerveless generation. There is much to be said of the immense mineral wealth California has poured into the lap of the nation, and still more to be said of the empire of national strength that California is to the Union. There ought to be and will be something said by the orators and the poets and songsters of the day of the men and women of genius and heroism California has developed, of her homes and her industries, of her trials and her triumphs, and of her manifest destiny—all these things we can trust the orators and sweet singers of the day to elaborate.

It is well to recall them, to take pride in them, to learn from them how to mark out for the State and her citizen men and women better and broader ways for the future, higher aims and loftier purposes and director and better methods of accomplishment. We hail the day and greet the Pioneers and the Native Sons and Daughters with approval for the ceremonial that mark the passage of the fortieth anniversary of the birth of the State.

PLAIN BUT TRUE SPEAKING.

Reginald F. D. Palgrave, the accomplished parliamentarian and Clerk of the English House of Commons, has been writing in the York and Lancaster Review of the much debated ruling of Speaker Reed, and the adoption of Rule XV, relative to the ascertainment of the presence of a quorum. The following extract from his essay is to the point, and very sharply and directly:

"The root and nature of the error which created the Congressional crisis of January last are now exposed. Had the speaker been the speaker of the House of Representatives, I should not have ventured to intervene, but the error has such wide proportions, and sets on so many shoulders, that from it all personality and partisanship is eliminated. It is an error of the United States. By their recent and their active sanction, they have, during the course of many years, supported their House of Representatives in the low regard they pay to the highest duty of a citizen. Here, then, lies the remedy. If Congress will not give vitality to the rule which requires the members to come like men with their eyes and ears, and to be ready to vote on the merits of the measure that is before them, the legislative assembly of a continental nation of 60,000,000 people, who have not been injured and annoyed by a service beyond the reach of the most radical reformer in effect on England."

Mr. Palgrave has thus given us a sharp rap, but a deserved one. It is the truth, as every thinking man knows, though but slowly if any have prior to the year 1890 dared to utter it, that we have all these years of our history been legislating without compelling all legislators to do the duty they have undertaken. If the members of Congress is absent without leave, and is by process returned to the chamber he ought to be compelled to vote or else be counted as silent, not absent. But we have been drooling along under the practice of abstention. As Mr. Palgrave clearly intimates, we have thought of "good politics," "donable tactics," and justifiable chicanery, to defeat legislation by a trick, and "avoidance of duty-doing." The many should be enforced by the people—

ATTEND AND VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED. If not, you shall step down and out, and a more trustworthy man be put in your place.

POLITICAL ORTHODOXY.

Belmont's Magazine says, "It must not be overlooked that reciprocity is not orthodox Republicanism." True enough, in one sense, wholly error in another. There is no such thing as "orthodox Republicanism," as Belmont's construes it. On the contrary, Republicanism in its purity is progression. It is not the law of the past, but the need of the hour. Consistency in Republicanism is the truth of to-day, not the position of yesterday. With the true Republican the question is what is right now, what is best for the nation in the present; not "what did my party deem wise last week or last year?" If reciprocity, as proposed by the State Department, is the best for the material interests of the nation and its most stable advancement, then the Republican party should be and will be its advocate, wholly irrespective of what its views may have been upon the questions in apparent conflict with reciprocity between commercial nations. The true national party is not hide-bound; it is not the slave of a mere creed, nor the servile instrument of the past. It is the party that has the courage and the ability to face any emergency, and to act in the light of the present and the need of the hour demands. The difficulty with the Democratic party is that it is one of precedents or orthodoxy; that it has uniformly made the past an obstruction in the pathway of the present; that it has forever been looking backward, and seldom, if ever, forward. It has never risen equal to the emergencies of a present, and when it has attempted to do so, it has always been apologetically, or with such clinging to the leading strings of the past, as to disclose its insincerity and the want of courage to grapple with the things of to-day, for fear of the judgment of the record of yesterday. In other words, it is a non-progressive and obstructing party, because it is so slavishly orthodox.
