

KITE-SHAPED TRACKS.

RACING MEN AS A RULE ARE OPPOSED TO THEM.

Secretary Smith of the State Agricultural Society Gives His Views on the Subject.

Discussion of the merits of the kite-shaped race-track is warming up all over the United States, and this same discussion is developing the fact that horsemen and racing men as a rule are opposed to the new idea. Breeders, however, favor it—this is a certain class of them.

The New York special of the Times recently came out in an article against the kite-shaped track, and subsequently invited all noted horse and racing experts of the country to communicate their opinions on the matter.

Communications that come from racing men as a rule, as before mentioned, oppose the "kite-shaped" thing.

Edwin F. Smith, of this city, secretary of the state agricultural society, has been asked to give his approval of the new track. In his letter to the special dated October 17th, he says:

"The adoption of this character of race tracks does not only do away with all comparisons but will have a tendency to lessen the interest in the sport. In my own case I note the lack of interest taken in the straightaway events at Alameda and Morris Parks. The time made is uninteresting and bewildering.

"Generally in the paragraph above no mention is made of the course used, and only those familiar understand the nature of the course. A newspaper headline in New York says: 'Three-quarters in 1:50, five-furlongs in 3:00 seconds, and so on. No one who is not familiar with the course can understand the meaning of the headline, and it is not fair to the public to publish such information without explaining the circumstances that brought it about. The casual observer meets you and remarks about the wonderful accomplishment, what is the meaning of the headline, and, not giving credit to the real cause, the credit is misplaced. Something after the same manner the writer of the article takes the trouble to detract from California the advantages of climate, and takes the credit for the leader of the animals that accomplished so much.

"I make no attempt to keep track of records made on straightaway tracks, while the performance of horses at Washington, Pa., is always as fresh in my memory. Why? Because it was made upon the same character of track as was the famous race of Ten Broeck. It, with the great assistance of past experience, reads cannot be understood. The question arises: why should we not attempt to take the course by the invention or encouragement of any aid in the way of shaping tracks that advances the interest of the public? It is not meant on common ground, as with other contests. Why now attempt to wipe out what has been accomplished by the established standard, and hereby let animals in that failed to obtain the speed requirements necessary to admit them into the innovation?

"Outside of this desire on the part of the kite-shaped track advocates, the greater question to consider, and that is the admission of the public to the race. The superior performance of this kind of track is becoming more and more interesting to the public. What lover of this sport is to be commended with the heart and hand for the story about the training race that does not enjoy observing the action during the race? The story about the man who took the mile was done? Why? Because the crowd was so large that the spectators were not permitted to see the race, and note with murmurs perceptible their disapproval of a long break or any other occurrence during the running of a race.

"No, the public do not ask this change nor will they support it. Easy to be seen, the breeding industry on such speed lines as to do my mile over the ground, or did it take at track more money speaking, and did it take more money to shoot at, I do not desire to claim superiority. I want to do it, and I want to have no explanation to make. I say let the national and California Agricultural Company adopt a standard course, and let that be the regulation track, with one-fourth mile turns and one-fourth mile straightaways.
