New York, November 17th.--The stock market today, after having time to recover from the scare of Saturday, was much less active than for any day during the past two weeks and the market was decidedly confidence causing a slow but material advance in values along the line. Notwithstanding the fact, there was a great irregularity and feverishness throughout the entire day. There were two more failures announced, both due to the shrinkage in values, but also being the result of social revolution and speculations show conclusively that the market for a long time has been largely overvalued and overextended.

It is now steady with the general list well held and small fractions above the opening figures. Wierum states that the engagements of the firm are small. He expects an early adjustment. The suspension was a great surprise to the street. The failure is said by friends of the firm to be due mainly to Randall's physical inability to be on the floor of the Exchange. It is understood that arrangements have been perfected to re-establish the house at an early day.
