LONDON, November 26th.-After Parnell refused to call a meeting of the Irish members of the Commons last night, the meeting was held to-day. Parnell was present and called the meeting. The meeting lasted an hour. There was great divergence of opinion. No definite action was agreed upon and the meeting adjourned to 5 o'clock this evening.

It is admitted by the majority of the meeting that a strong feeling in favor of Parnell's resignation of the leadership is being manifested. Parnell would seem to be without food of any kind.
