OBITUARY.

Just as THE CRITIC was completing the twelfth year of its existence by the issue of its editions of yesterday, one of its founders, a man endeared to all connected with it by many admirable qualities and well-known throughout this community as its active business manager, passed away from the scenes of his earthly labors. Of the high estimation in which he was held and the many warm friendships he inspired among those with whom he was brought into business or personal relations, abundant proofs have been furnished by the many kind inquiries and expressions of sympathy that reached this office during the past week. His eulogy has been written in the hearts and memories of men by his daily intercourse with them, and we need only present here a few of the leading facts in his personal history and give such poor and inadequate expression as we can to the affectionate appreciation he elicited from those more closely associated with him in the labors of his later years.

Mr. Jacob Carpenter Miller was born on the 6th of November, 1832, in Lancaster, Pa. His father, Gen. David Miller, was a prominent and highly respected citizen of that place, and his mother, Mrs. Catherine Miller, was the daughter of Jacob Carpenter, of the same city, who was Treasurer of the State of Pennsylvania at the close of the last century, and of whom it was written that "He was a whig in principle, a philosopher in intellect and a patriot in practice." In 1836 General Miller removed to Philadelphia, and the subject of this notice, then in his fourth year, spent the remainder of his boyhood in that city, except while absent in attendance at an Academy. He subsequently lived for a time in Baltimore county, Maryland, but in 1857 he returned to Philadelphia, where he renewed an acquaintance with Col. J. W. Forney, who had long been an intimate personal friend of his father. It was this acquaintance which determined his subsequent career. In 1861 Col. Forney established in this city the Sundry Chronicle, and having recognized Mr. Miller's energy, activity and business capacity invited him to come here and take charge of its business department. Less than a year later the enterprise was greatly enlarged by the establishment of the Daily Chronicle, of which Mr. D. C. Forney became the publisher, while Mr. Miller assumed the active part in its business management for which he was so eminently fitted. Throughout the war the business of the Chronicle was very extensive, and Mr. Miller's signally efficient services were a conspicuous element among the causes of its pecuniary success. His connection with the Chronicle continued until its sale by Col. Forney on the first of January, 1871, and he subsequently took charge of the large amount of business which remained unsettled when that paper was transferred to its new proprietors.

In the meantime he had associated himself with Messrs. G. B. P. Ringwalt and E. M. Hack in the publication of THE DAILY CRITIC, which was started on the 31st of August, 1868, and of which he has had from that time until his last illness, the business direction, taking an active interest in its every department and throwing into his work the tireless energy which was so conspicuous in him. To this energy, coupled with his indomitable pluck, his keen alertness of mind and his business sagacity and judgment, and to his personal popularity, won by scrupulous fair dealing, genuine integrity, and ingrained frankness and kindness of character, was due the marked success he attained in building up an enterprise, the difficulties of which may be readily estimated by the

number of failures that have occurred in the same field in this city. He has always maintained the most amicable relations with his associates in business, whose rights and interests have been with him more sacred than his own. As a husband and father, he was one of the most affectionate of men, and his intercourse with all was marked by unvarying fairness and genuine kindness. Quick and prompt in speech and action, throwing himself into his work, whatever it might be, with concentrated earnestness, his manner might sometimes have impressed a stranger asavoring of brusqueness, but his habitual tone was cheerful and good humored, even in the midst of labors by which most men would have been rendered moody and irritable, and while he never concealed his resentments or antipathies, it may be said that few men have lived who have been animated by a broader charity, a tenderer consideration of the rights and feelings of others, or a deeper, truer or more practical kindness of nature. His sympathies were easily touched, and he was ever ready to lend substantial assistance to the needy or distressed. As expressive of the estimation in which he was held, we copy the following justly appreciative paragraph from a notice of his death in this morning's National Republican.

In the death of few men have the citizens of Washington found cause for more regret. In all the relations of life, social and business, Mr. Miller had won the respect, the confidence and the affection which come of doing one's duty thoroughly, promptly and pleasantly. In person, Mr. Miller was of medium height and close, wiry build. He was of dark complexion, hair and eyes, quick, prompt and energetic in movement, of very pleasant address, and possessed the faculty of making friends of all his acquaintances. Few men in Washington were more beloved than he. He leaves a widow, nee Miss Catharine Durham, of Baltimore, and one child, a girl, about eight years of age. His domestic relations were very pleasant and agreeable, as he carried into the social circle the same qualities that made him so popular among business people. The friends who were around his couch during his last illness, state that Mr. Miller, although not a member of any church, died in the consolations of the Christian faith; and those who know him best can bear witness that in all his relations with his fellow-men, he had lived in the truest and most practical meaning of the words a Christian life.
