A Bold Robbery of Carpenters' Tools. A number of carpenters employed in a new residence in the neighborhood of Fifth and K streets, left a valuable kit of tools on the premises, when they left there Thursday evening, and on Friday the tools were found to be nearly all missing.

Witness Fees. Mrs. Belva A. Lockwood made a persistent but ineffectual effort to induce Judge Cox to order the payment of witness fees to Alice Miller, a woman who has been in jail for nearly seven months, in connection with the George Brown pension fraud case, in which it is claimed she portrayed three different persons in order to draw money on the stolen pension certificate.

Prisoners Sentenced. Sentences in cases decided during the last two weeks were imposed by Judge Cox to-day. Wayman Brooks, convicted of grand larceny, sentenced to Auburn State prison for one year at labor; John Smallwood, grand larceny, and sentenced to Auburn prison for three years at labor; John Paul Brown, assault with intent to kill, sentenced postponed till next Saturday.

Eclipse of the Moon. There will be a total eclipse of the moon to-night, visible to such persons as care to stay up till after midnight, provided, of course, that the sky is clear. Those who are not willing to sacrifice an hour's sleep for the purpose of witnessing this phenomenon, can go to bed with the comfortable assurance that the machinery of the solar system is in good working order, and that the shadow that is thrown across the silver disc of the moon will pass away at the appointed time. The first contact of the shadow will be seen at places on the meridian of Baltimore about five minutes past twelve. The total obscuration will be at six minutes past one, and the moon will pass entirely out of the shadow about twenty-seven minutes past three.

Fraudulent Use of Beer Stamps. The United States marshal at Hartford, Ct., has made a singular report that the children of the Catholic schools of that city have been, by direction of their teachers, in the habit of taking the internal revenue stamps from beer barrels before they were cancelled and sending them to France, from where they were sent back and sold to brewers at a discount. The proceeds were to fund an orphan asylum in France. In the possession of the instructor was found \$250 worth of these stamps. They are beyond legal liability.

Good Samaritans.—The District Grand Lodge No. 3 held its 18th anniversary yesterday afternoon.

Divorce Granted.—Mary A. Grass received a divorce yesterday from Frederick Grass, on the ground of desertion.

A Disagreeing Jury.—The jury in the case of Simon Joseph and James Crusor failed to agree yesterday, and the case was abandoned. Eleven jurors favored an acquittal and one a conviction.

Newspaper Change.—Colonel R. J. Hinton has purchased the Sunday Gazette, and will conduct it as a liberal republican journal.

A New Residence.—Ex-Congressman Jo Johnson, of Virginia, has purchased the mansion on Connecticut avenue occupied by him last winter.

The Mt. Vernon Regents.—The rain yesterday reduced the attendance at Mount Vernon. The council held a long session, but routine matters only were attended to. The sessions close this afternoon.

To Co-operate.—The leading plumbers have agreed to heartily co-operate with the District Health Officer in carrying out the proposed regulations governing plumbing, house drainage, &c.

The Greeley Expedition.—Lieut. Lockwood and fourteen men, belonging to the Greeley Arctic expedition, will leave Baltimore on Tuesday for St. John's, N. B. Lieut. Greeley and three men will leave for St. John's on the 21st inst. The expedition will start north in the early part of July.

Injuring the Streets.—The Commissioners have received a complaint that A. Richards is injuring the streets in the southern part of the city by removing clay from them.

Disastrous to Business.—The grand jury have concluded not to lay the complaints of business men about the condition of Louisiana avenue before the Commissioners at present.

A Valuable Prize.—A handsome and appropriate silver goblet, presented by J. T. Beckham, will be the prize for the best score at the Glymont shooting match.

A Runaway.—The little son of Mr. J. W. Out was seated in his father's buggy at First and D streets, yesterday, when the horse took fright, ran away and upset the buggy, slightly injuring the boy, and continued its run out H street to Thirteenth.

Services Resumed.—The regular church services at Fletcher Chapel, corner of Fourth street and New York avenue northwest, which have been temporarily suspended since conference, will be resumed to-morrow morning, and will hereafter be conducted regularly. Rev. Mr. King, formerly a member of the Baltimore conference, having, by the unanimous request of the parties interested, consented to act as a supply.

To Be Discontinued.—From and after the 30th instant, mail messenger service between this city and Brightwood, D. C., will be discontinued.

Another Rumor.—It is rumored that Gen. Dumont is to be replated as supervising inspector-general of steam vessels.

Indictments.—The grand jury yesterday returned a number of indictments, among them bills against Samuel Bray, assault with intent to kill George Piper, Robert McGee, assault with intent to kill Henry Roberts. The charge of violating the internal revenue laws against James Vaner-man was ignored.

The Indian Doctor. Wm. H. Douglass, better known as Red Syn, who was convicted some time ago for assaulting Health Officer Townsend, was brought into the Criminal Court to-day for sentence. The question of a new trial was fully discussed, and the motion was finally overruled. The violent herb doctor was sentenced by Judge Cox to three months in jail.
