"AID AND COMFORT" TO THE ENEMY. POLK'S PASS TO SANTA ANNA.

The Commander of our Naval forces in the Gulf is hereby directed not to obstruct the passage of Gen. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna and suite to Mexico, should they attempt to return thither. JAMES K. POLK. May 15, 1846.

Polk's admission of having granted the pass. "When orders were issued to the Commander of our Naval forces in the Gulf, on the 15th day of May last, only two days after the expiration of the war had been recognized by Congress, to place the coast of Mexico under blockade, he was directed not to obstruct the passage of Santa Anna to Mexico should he return. Polk's Annual Message to Congress, Dec. 7, '46.

It remains to be seen whether his return may not yet prove favorable to a pacific adjustment of existing difficulties.—Idid.

What has been seen. BATTLE OF MONTEREY.—September 21, 22, 23, 1846.—three days hard fighting between Gen. Zachary Taylor with three thousand men, and Gen. Ampudia with twelve thousand men, resulting in the capitulation of the City—loss of the Americans in killed and wounded—Five Hundred!

BATTLE OF BUENA VISTA.—February 22d, 23d, 24th, 1846.—Gen. Zachary Taylor with five thousand volunteers, and Santa Anna commanding a Mexican force of twenty thousand men—resulting in the total overthrow of the enemy—loss of the Americans in killed and wounded—Seven Hundred!

FALL OF YENA CITY, and the Castle of Ullin, March 28th, 1847.—Gen. Scott with four thousand men of the town by Gen. Segal with four thousand men—loss of the Americans in killed and wounded—One Hundred!

BATTLE OF CERRO GORDO.—April 17th and 18th, two days hard fighting, between Gen. Scott with twelve thousand men, and Santa Anna commanding a Mexican force of twenty thousand men, resulting in the overthrow of the enemy—loss of the Americans in killed and wounded—Two Hundred and Fifty.

Said Mary left her school about P. M. on the 20th of May, 1847, and since that time has not been seen. She is only 15 years of age, 4 feet 9 inches, black hair, small black eyes, rather thick pointing lips, red cheeks, small features, pretty and quite girlish in appearance. She wore a small plain calico dress, pink, purple and blue; black silk cape and apron, black gaiter boots, pink silk shirred hat, and green veil; two small chased finger rings, a gold pencil attached to a black cord, and her nails quite short from biting them. It is strongly suspected that she has been abducted by a person named Michel, alias Martin Hare, formerly proprietor of a Bowling Green, located near No. 309 Broadway, opposite the Franklin House, who she scolded about that time from this city, deserting his wife and leaving her entirely destitute of support.

Said Hare is about 28 years of age, no whiskers, fair complexion, and rather genteel appearance. He was seen lurking in the neighborhood of her school a short time previous, disguised with false whiskers.

A sister of Hare, named Margaret, was followed by him from a boarding school about the time of the abduction, and is supposed to be with them. She is described as follows: Very dark hair, almost black; dark skin, grey eyes, prominent eyebrows, a small scar on one eyebrow, a small scar on the right cheek as if made by small pox, a scar formed by a gash upon the end of the nose, nearly an inch in length, the tooth next to the first double tooth on the left side of the face gone; she is about seventeen years of age.
