"AID AND COMFORT" TO THE ENEMY. POLK'S PASS TO SANTA ANNA. The Commander of our Naval forces in the Gulf is hereby directed not to obstruct the passage of Gen. ANTONIO LOPEZ DE SANTA ANNA and suite to Mexico should he desire to return thither.

Polk's admission of having granted the pass. "When orders were issued to the Commander of our Naval forces in the Gulf, on the 15th day of May last, only two days after the existence of the war had been recognized by Congress, in place of a coast of Mexico under blockade, he was directed not to obstruct the passage of Santa Anna to Mexico should he return."
