THE DEPARTMENTS. GOVERNMENT receipts to-day: Internal revenue, \$448,474.05; customs, \$256,048.85.

ADMIRAL JOHN J. ALMY was to-day appointed by the President a visitor of the Government Hospital for the Insane.

THE ARRIVAL of the Adams at Panama from Guayaquil and her departure for Acapulco, is announced at the Navy Department.

THE PRESIDENT has signed the commission of John E. Lutz, D. P. Foley and P. W. Thomas as third Lieutenants in the Revenue Mail Service.

THE COMMISSIONS of a large number of postmasters for small offices in various sections of the country were issued by the Post Office Department to-day.

SECRETARY LINCOLN has directed the military authorities to compel the removal of the saloons and dance-houses which have been established in the city.

COMMISSIONER RAUM is making his annual examination of all the collection officers under the Internal Revenue Bureau.

AMONG THOSE who had audiences with the President to-day, were Senator Don Cameron, Ex-Senators Pomeroy and Mitchell, First Assistant Postmaster-General Tyrner, Fifth Auditor Alexander, Judge Johnson, and Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Weaver.

CAPT. BELKNAP, commanding the Alaska, writes to the Department, under date of Callao, Peru, May 26, that on the 24th the Alaska and the Onward participated with H. M. S. Kingfisher in dressing ship and firing a salute of twenty-one guns in honor of the birthday of her Majesty the Queen.

IT HAS BEEN REPORTED that Secretary Lincoln's mother is dying and that he had received the news with great effect, and to return to her bedside at once.

CABINET MEETING.—All the members of the Cabinet were present at the meeting to-day. It was expected that the question of the new District Commissioners would be decided, but as a fact, the matter was not even mentioned.

THE PENSION OFFICE.—Commissioner Bentley has assigned all the work of the office to-day, and Deputy Commissioner O. P. G. Clark will act until Colonel Dudley arrives at Washington and qualifies for the duties of the position.

THE USE of tobacco by the cadets at the Naval Academy has been prohibited by an order dated June 14. The order says: "The experiment of permitting the naval cadets to smoke at the Naval Academy, having been fairly tried for nearly three years, has been found injurious to their health, discipline and power of study."

A DENIAL FROM MR. UPTON.—It was rumored again to-day that Assistant Secretary Upton had resigned his office. A representative of THE CRITIC told him of the rumor, and he was tired of denying these silly rumors.

GEN. WILLIAMSON, ex-Commissioner of the General Land Office, will leave Washington to-night for flying trips to New York and Boston. Two weeks hence he will leave for the Pacific coast, where he will look into the details of his duties as the manager of the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad.

THE WHITTAKER CASE.—The published statements purporting to give the result of the finding of the general court-martial in the case of Cadet Whittaker are mere speculation. There seems to be a feeling prevalent that the finding of the court is adverse to Whittaker, but this feeling is based on nothing.

THE TREASURY INVESTIGATION.—There are no new developments in connection with the Treasury investigation. Secretary Windon declines to give out the report of the committee on the ground that it is so early in the investigation that it is premature to issue a preliminary report.

NAVAL BULLETIN.—Capt. W. P. McCann has been detached from command of the Independence, and ordered to command the Pensacola; Lieut. J. C. Irvine, Master Albert Bert, Ensign W. E. Whitfield, Mate L. B. Gallagher, Surgeon B. F. Kidder, Passed Assistant Surgeon J. E. Bagg and Boatswain E. J. Allen from the New Hampshire, and ordered to the Wyoming; Master T. B. Howard from the Kearsarge, and ordered to the Dale; Passed Assistant Paymaster H. C. Machee from the New Hampshire, and ordered to settle accounts.

MR. W. B. HAZLET, the handsome young managing editor of the Baltimore American, was in Washington to-day inspecting corner lots and airing a new spring suit.

THE JEANNETTE SEARCH. The Rodgers Off for the Arctic.—The Officers and Crew in Excellent Spirits.

THE UNEXPECTED detention of the Rodgers developed more than any one expected the general interest in her fate, and long before the hour named for her sailing the wharves on Mission Bay were crowded with spectators.

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FROM ALBANY. Bradley's Examination Resumed.—He Explains His Gambling Operations.—The Vote for Conkling's Successor.

ALBANY, June 17.—The bribery investigation was resumed this morning.

MR. BRADLEY was called and examined by Mr. Bangs.

HOW DID YOU dispose of the money you held in trust for the State?

MR. BRADLEY—I deposited the money in the First National Bank of Albany, taking certificate of deposit for each of them.

CROSS-EXAMINED BY MR. PECKHAM—I had a lawsuit with Mr. Blyden on my return from Texas; we got a judgment against him, but one case was carried to the Court of Appeals, and there decision reversed and made against us.

MR. BANGS asked the ruling of the committee on the question if they understood from the resolution appointing them that they had the right to examine into charges against persons other than members of the Assembly.

THE VOTE FOR THE SENATORSHIP. ALBANY, June 17.—The following is the vote at noon to-day in the State Legislature for a Senator in the place of Roscoe Conkling: Jacobs, 47; Conkling, 27; Wheeler, 20; Cornell, 8; Lapham, 16; Bradley, 1; Foster, 3; Tremain, 3; Crowley, 1. No choice.

THE RACES AT ASCOT. LONDON, June 17.—After the race for the Royal memorial stakes at Ascot (Hants) yesterday, Mr. P. Lorillard's chestnut colt Wallenstein was sold to Charles Archer, his trainer, and he will not again carry Mr. Lorillard's colors.

WALLENSTEIN has been scratched for the Washington stakes and Alexander's place, both of which will occur at Ascot to-day. Lord Allington's Bendor has been scratched for the race for the handicap stakes, which will also be run to-day.

ARRESTED FOR MURDER. GALVESTON, June 17.—The New Weatherford special dispatch says: "William and Frank Kirby, sons of a prominent farmer, have been arrested, charged with a murder committed two months ago. A supposed house thief was found dangling from a limb in Jack county, and it is said the evidence will prove the hanging to have been done by the Kirbys and five others, who will be arrested."

THE UNIVERSITY BOAT RACE. LONDON, June 17.—The Cornell University crew were not afloat at Henley yesterday, having gone to the races.

POLITICAL POINTS. THE Cambridge Democrat and News urges the nomination of Mr. George J. Meekins, of Dorchester County, Md., for comptroller by the Democratic State Convention.

IN THE Iowa Democratic Convention yesterday Judge L. G. Plume, of Tama County, was named for governor by acclamation; G. M. Walker, of Polk County, for lieutenant-governor on the first ballot, and H. B. Henderson, of Walpole County, for judge of the supreme court by acclamation.

IT WAS announced in the leading journals of Paris a few months ago that the only daughter of a millionaire at Lowell (Mass.) millionaire was soon to marry one of the Bourbons, a cousin of Don Carlos of Spain. But the marriage never occurred, because the Yankee girl wouldn't invest.

THE price called every day last winter at the hotel where the young woman resided. In the words of the Paris correspondent of the San Francisco Chronicle: "Fanny the noble scion of the very illustrious and thrice noble House of Bourbon gives on his knees to \$2,000,000 worth of sarsaparilla! But I may have overdrawn the picture. It is not certain that the noble prince actually sat upon his marrow bones in propria persona. He did that by proxy. Though he paid court assiduously and daily in person, the prince sent a formal demand, or to speak exactly, several demands by his chamberlain. For, though a prince may have no cash as long as he can borrow money he keeps up a petty court, and of course, must have his chamberlain. On one occasion, when this deputy came to ask the hand of Miss — in marriage, or rather to inform that young lady that his Highness the Prince A — de Bourbon proposed to confer upon her, a plain untitled American the honor of his name and high-sounding title, Miss — quite peremptorily refused the honor. Whereupon the chamberlain exclaimed: 'Do not say you refuse him! His Highness the Prince is not a personage who can be refused! Oh, no! 'Tis impossible. Put it in some other form, I beg of you. Say that you are unable to accept of the honor offered you. Anything but a refusal! The prince is not an ordinary man to be rejected in this manner!' Notwithstanding the fervid eloquence of the chamberlain, the 'no' of the Yankee girl was positive. 'Tell your master,' she said to the deputy, 'that I don't want titles half as badly as he wants cash.'"

THE executive committee of the Virginia Republican Association, headed by General Wickham and Representatives Desondor and Jorgenson, had a long interview with the President this afternoon, beginning at 3:30 o'clock, on the political situation in that State, with view to a settlement of his part and an operation on the side of straight-out; and to that end the President was urged to recognize their claims in the distribution of Federal patronage in that State. The interview was secret.

She then left the court-room, saying she would no longer allow herself to be insulted.
