BANG'S BLOCKADE

OF THE ALBANY INVESTIGATION. The Committee refuse to proceed in His Absence—John I. Davenport's Indignation—The Action of the Committee a Put-Up Job Against Him.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 21.—The Bradley Bribery investigation committee resumed its session this morning, but after forty-five minutes, adjourned until to-morrow, on account of the absence in New York of Mr. Davenport.

Mr. Davenport was present in committee. John I. Davenport was present and made a speech, appealing to the committee to hear his statement in reply to Senator Strahan's charge that he attempted to bribe him by the offer of a United States marshalship to vote against Conkling and Platt.

Mr. Davenport was very bitter and indignant and made a long speech, as soon as Strahan's statement was made the committee had adjourned for three days to allow the story to have effect on the public mind; and now when he (Davenport) was ready to testify counsel was absent. It was unfair, as he could not appear at present before Thursday.

The committee also refused to hear James Tillgham, of the Central Railroad until Bangs could be present. Counsel for Senator Sessions remonstrated, but to no effect. J. A. Wallace of Olean, Bradley's home, was, upon the appeal of counsel, put on the stand. His testimony was not presented but a few minutes before the committee refused to continue until Mr. Bangs could be present. The vote was 4 to 3, which is the way the committee divides on all questions.

Wallace testified that Bradley stated to him that there would be sensational developments and that members could get money for their votes.

An Ocean Disaster. NEW YORK, June 21.—A St. Johns, N. F., steamer which the commander of the steamer Kite from Sidney, reports having passed on the 17th inst., in latitude 46° 10' north, longitude 53° 35' west, a large ship, bottom upward and half sunk. The vessel appeared to be about 1,200 tons burden and had succumbed to fire. Fate of crew and passengers unknown.

First Murder, Then Suicide. DETROIT, Mich., June 21.—William Lane, the man who acknowledged having poisoned and attempted to drown George Allen, on account of an infatuation for the latter's wife, attempted to commit suicide in jail last night by breaking and swallowing the glasses of his spectacles. No serious results has followed as yet.

THE FACTION FIGHT.

Proceedings at Albany To-day—Pro-Position to Adjourn to Saratoga—The Democrats to Stand Firm.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 21.—The joint convention resumed its session at noon to-day. The ballot for a successor to Conkling resulted: Conkling, 33; Wheeler, 25; Lapham, 25; Cornell, 3; Folger, 2; Crowley, 1; Bradley, 1; Jacobs, 50. Total, 153.

The joint ballot for Mr. Platt's successor was as follows: Depew, 52; Platt, 37; Kernan, 51; Wheeler, 3; Crowley, 4; Bliss, 1; Cornell, 1; Folger, 1; Tremain, 1; Total, 155.

After the announcement of the ballot Mr. Patten, of Saratoga, moved that when the joint convention adjourned next Saturday it be to meet at Saratoga. Objection was made, and, after a brief discussion, the resolution was declared out of order by Lieutenant-Governor Hoskins.

During the discussion Mr. Spindola (Democrat) announced that the Legislature had ceased to sit in obedience to duties of the State, and was in session merely at the dictate of party necessity; that if the Republican faction expected, by any tactics, to break the Democratic ranks, they labored under a mistake, and that the Democrats would stand firm. A motion to adjourn until to-morrow was voted down—yeas, 69; nays, 83—and the convention proceeded to second ballot.

The second joint ballot for a successor to Conkling was as follows: Wheeler, 25; Jacobs, 50; Conkling, 33; Lapham, 25; Crowley, 3; Bradley, 1; Cornell, 1; Tremain, 1; Folger, 2. Total, 150.

The second stated joint ballot for a successor to Platt was as follows: Depew, 50; Kernan, 51; Platt, 37; Wheeler, 4; Crowley, 5; Cornell, 1; Lapham, 1; Bliss, 1; Tremain, 1; Folger, 1. Total, 150.

During second ballot, Assemblyman Trimble, of New York, presented a petition signed by 30,000 constituents, expressing the hope that they would endeavor to maintain the deadlock in order that ex-Vice-President Wheeler, known as the "Lion Fisherman," might not get to the fishing-grounds and deplete waters of fish. The petition created great mirth, and was declared out of order.

A motion was made to adjourn, and the Half-breeds voted no, the Democrats and Stalwarts yes. The motion was carried, (yeas 79, nays 61), and the convention adjourned.
