IT IS PUBLISHED in the European papers that Pope Leo is quite the reverse in manner of the late Pontiff Pius the Ninth. While the latter was all ease and gentleness and most dignifiedly gracious, Pope Leo is represented as distant, reserved and practically business-like in all of his dealings, and refusing to waste a moment of time with interviewers or visitors. Pope Leo is a newspaper man, being editor of the Aurora, as well as Sovereign Pontiff, and knows the value of time and can gauge down to the finest of points.

WE HAVE IT AT LAST. The Boston Journal gives what purports to be the inside history of the return of the Chinese students to their own country. The action seems to have been the result of too hasty conclusions reached by the commissioner sent out by the Chinese government to investigate the working progress of the students at Hartford. He found that some of the young men had cut off their noses, adopted American garb, and, except in face, had become quite un-Chinese. Yung Wing tried to explain that the changes had been made simply on the principle of doing in Rome as the Romans do. The commissioner would not be convinced that the hearts of the young men were not turning from the traditions of the celestial, and wrote home a letter strongly condemning the course of the mission. He declared that the boys were becoming alienated from their country and its customs, and that the ideas they were acquiring tended to undermining the most sacred traditional principles of the home government.

THE MOST STARTLING and repulsive case of semi-legal seduction on record was that perpetrated recently by a worthless soul on a most estimable young lady of Richmond, Va. The young girl is the daughter of a highly respectable family, and lived with her mother, an aged widow lady. Seeing an advertisement in the Hartford (Conn.) Churchman, of a widower desirous of employing a governess for his daughter, and as her family was poor, she answered it, offering her services. The advertiser, who represented himself as Thomas Marvin, responded in person and represented himself as a wealthy widower from the West. The young lady, who is very beautiful, was highly recommended by letters from the leading gentlemen of Richmond, and the "gentleman" expressed himself so highly pleased with the beautiful character given her, and with her personal grace and gracious manner, that he at once engaged her. He remained several days, and the final result of his visit was that he proposed marriage, and the bride, \$30,000, the contract being drawn up by the Richmond judge who had been one of the strongest endorsers of the young lady. Marvin's personal appearance, plausible manner, and the character of letters of introduction and credit which he brought with him, gained him a standing in the city and established such confidence in him that he had no difficulty in negotiating at the First National Bank a draft on Chicago for \$500. The parties were married and started on an extended wedding tour. The first intimation of the fraud was the returning of the draft, dishonored, from Chicago. Detectives were put on his track. The next heard was a telegram from Albion, N. Y., from the unhappy young lady, asking if it were true that a fatal accident had befallen her mother. It was evident that the scoundrel had put up such a story in order to get rid of his newly-made wife. Friends of the lady at once went to Albion. The fellow, Marvin, jumped the town, deserting the lady, and is supposed to be in Canada. The unfortunate girl has returned to Richmond. A more heartless act on the part of a man has never been recorded.

WE SEE MUCH COMMENT and criticism of an unfavorable character upon the action of the Governor of Texas in declining to issue a proclamation calling for a day of prayer, fasting and thanksgiving in tribute to the All-High for the recovery of President Garfield. The criticisms, on our plan of thinking, are entirely unjust, and the wording of the Governor's telegram to Governor Foster and personal expression of sentiments of sympathy, evidence that the Governor of Texas is a gentleman of strictly conscientious character, and a remarkably honest and brave man not to swerve from his ideas of the Constitution and laws at this time when, by his honesty and candor, he subjects himself to insidious and bigoted assaults. He has ever held that the Church and State should be kept separate and distinct. He has never called a National Thanksgiving during his tenure of office. He believes that a Governor of a State has no more right to order a religious prayer-day than a bishop has to call a political meeting together; and under this belief he acts, and when our people come to examine the case in all its details, and the Constitution in its bearings upon it, they will perform commend the Texas Governor for his manliness in standing up to his convictions. Had he declined abruptly and without an explanation of his reasons, it would have been different; but all of these he tendered and rendered to Governor Foster upon the receipt of the original telegram in connection with the day of prayer and thanksgiving.
