Wook.-The Milwaukee Scalinel contains a long letter on Wool, written by a retired wool trader, in which he takes the N. Y. Tribune so verely to task for their recent article on Wool, in which wool-growers are cautioned against selling in advance of shearing, to speculators desiring to contract for it. He says: selling in navance of sucarring, to specimators desiring to contract for it. He says:

There are but few sections of the United States which produce full blood wool in any considerable quantities. Wool sold in market at this season of the year, being old wool, has shrunk from 5 to 6 per cent since last spring. I notice in the recent Boston sales a sale of Vermont finefleeces at 48 cents. I select that as being nearer the fineness of Wisconsin wool than any lot I notice in the sale, but probably not so light. It should be borne in mind that interest, insurance, storage, freights and commissions are to be deducted, to ascertain what its nett value would be to the farmer in cash. To illustrate: a lot of wool mow sold at 100 cents, 6 months, would result as follows:

My object in this article being simply an endeavor to throw a better light upon the subject, I will venture a word or two of advice to farmers, in relation to the manner of washing and putting up wool for market. Wisconsin wools have always suffered in reputation, in the Eastern markets, on account of the carcless slovenly, not to say dishonest, way in which many farmers have put up their wool. Every farmer should have his wool well washed, well tagged, and each fleece done up with linen twine. By doing this he will always be able to obtain the highest market prices for his wool.

I will repeat that I have no doubt good prices will prevail in the early part of the season, but not the extravagant ones that some parties have been led to believe.
