Fall of a House and Loss of Life. NEW YORK, March 27. A three-story brick house, in progress of erection on Thirty-second street, fell in this afternoon, while twelve or fourteen mechanics were working inside. The ruins are being cleared up, and it is reported that five persons have been taken out dead. It is feared that more bodies are beneath the rubbish.

Destructive Fire in Philadelphia—One Million. PHILADELPHIA, March 28. A most destructive fire broke out last night in Bank alley, destroying four large four-story warehouses, running from Bank alley to Strawberry street, occupied by extensive importers of silks, laces, and fancy goods. The loss of Messrs. Stewart & Bro., No. 13 Bank street and 14 Strawberry street, is estimated at \$300,000. The loss of Messrs. Lewis & Bro., No. 11 Bank street and 12 Strawberry street, is \$550,000. Messrs. Gilson & Co., No. 9 Bank and 14 Strawberry sts., estimate their loss at \$200,000. Messrs. Wythe, Rogers & Co., in the upper story of Gilson & Co.'s warehouse, lost \$75,000. Messrs. E. M. Davis & Co., No. 16 Strawberry street, was slightly damaged; lost \$1,000. J. Edwards, oak cooper, lost \$1,000.

Messrs. Lewis & Bro., importers of British goods, were insured for \$25,000 in a London office, and the balance is covered by insurance in Philadelphia and New York. The loss of all the parties is nearly covered by insurance in Philadelphia and New York.

Steamboat Disaster. MEMPHIS, March 27. The steamer Pocahontas yesterday completed both flues of her middle boiler, scalding 18, and killing 8 persons. The sufferers are all from the Western States.

He sealed the wall with a rope-ladder which he had made of cotton filling, used in weaving, at which he was employed.

It was subsequently ascertained that he went to New York, and engaged passage in the steamer Asia for Liverpool, but was arrested on board the steamer, and brought back to Boston in custody of the sheriff of New London county, Ct. At the time of his arrest he had about six thousand dollars upon him. Brewer was admitted to bail in the sum of \$8,000, Thursday evening, to answer a charge of stealing five thousand dollars in gold, preferred by the Suffolk Bank.
