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AMERICAN TELEGRAPH. Mr. Botts's Letter.

WASHINGTON, May 3, 1852. MY DEAR SIR: You have no doubt been looking for a letter from me for the last several days, but I did not reach here till yesterday, having been detained by indisposition at home.

This morning I called on General Scott, and stated to him all that had passed between me and the South since my departure from Washington.

Gen. Scott occupies no doubtful or equivocal position on the Compromise, nor does he desire to do so; and if he did, I would not support him even if nominated.

It is an outrage upon decency, justice, and fair dealing that any man should, at this day, pretend to question the nationality or patriotism of Winfield Scott.

Under the circumstances mentioned, he has come to the conclusion (and I incline to think correctly) that the true course for him to pursue is, to publish nothing, unless he shall be compelled to do so.

It will be the dictate of those who are not his friends, many of whom desire an opportunity of giving vent to their passions, and of being again led to agitation; for while the North is, for the most part, willing to acquiesce, they are not prepared in a body (even those who do acquiesce) to endorse all the principles of the Compromise.

You are not to infer from anything that I have said that I write as the partisan of General Scott. I write as a Whig, to do justice to the position of a true Whig that has been traduced and slandered.

It is a little strange, but I have not yet seen the first man of any party who insisted on Scott's writing that would say he entertained any doubt about his opinions, and, if a Whig, was not clamorous for Taylor in '48 without pledges, while every body knows Scott, and nobody knew Taylor.
