HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION.

In Massachusetts the State senate has passed a bill of this kind with but two dissenting voices. An amendment to exempt \$1,000 worth of property was not carried in the Senate...

Sec. 1. In addition to the property now exempt, by law, from attachment and sale on execution, for debt, the real estate of any person residing within this Commonwealth...

Sec. 2. If any real estate, or interest therein, or any dwelling-house, held as aforesaid, shall be attached, or seized on execution, to be sold or levied upon, and the value thereof shall exceed five hundred dollars...

Sec. 3. Real estate, exempted by virtue of this act, shall not be deemed assets in the hands of any executor or administrator, nor shall such estate be in any way liable for the payment of the debts of the deceased owner...

Sec. 4. Such exemption shall not extend to any lien on any property, obtained before this act takes effect, by virtue of attachment, or otherwise.

Sec. 5. No conveyance or alienation, by the husband, of any property exempt and set off as aforesaid, shall be valid, unless the wife join in the deed of conveyance.
