GEORGETOWN AND ITS AFFAIRS.

GEORGETOWN, May 31-12 m.

The Boards of Aldermen and Common Council passed last night the following bills: One confining the graduation of a part of Frederick from Water to Fourth street; one in favor of Jas. H. Holtzman; and one authorizing the Clerk to pay the salaries of the respective officers of the Corporation for the year 1851.

The Board of Aldermen also passed the resolution from the Board of Common Council appropriating \$75 to purchase premiums for the pupils of the town school.

Officer Adams arrested on yesterday a man by the name of Arch Brown, charged with stealing cabbage from Mr. Douglas. Justice Weaver committed him to jail.

A fire occurred yesterday afternoon in the smoke-house of Michael Weaver, (butcher), on the Heights, which entirely consumed it, together with its contents.

Let the officers of Washington, Alexandria and Georgetown be on the look-out to-morrow—there is a prize-fight to come off on the Virginia shore, somewhere between the aqueduct and the Four-mile Run.

The offerings at Drovers' Rest for the week amounted to 263 head of beef cattle, 104 head of which were sold to Washington and Georgetown butchers at prices ranging from \$1 to 4 1/2 cents gross; 146 head drove to Baltimore and 13 head left over. Old sheep from \$2 to \$4; lambs, \$1.50 to \$2.12 1/2.

Our market was well supplied this morning with all the dainties of the season, and sold brisk at the following prices: Beef, best cuts, 12 1/2c per lb.; mutton, 8c per lb.; lamb, 50c/75c per qr.; butter, 25c per lb.; peas, 20c per pk.; potatoes, 25c per pk. Mr. Charles Cusby, of Fairfax, sold 140 quarters of fine strawberries at 10c per qt., which appeared to be about the price.

The flour and grain market is in an unsettled state; \$4@4.12 1/2, from all I can learn, are the highest figures for the former, and 90 cents for the latter. Corn remains unchanged. Oats 42 cents, struck measure.
