GRAND MILITARY AND CIVIC EXCURSION On Tuesday, the 15th of July.

THE WALKER SHARPSHOOTERS take pleasure in announcing to the citizens of Washington, Georgetown, and Alexandria, that their Annual Excursion will take place on FRIDAY, the 15th of July.

I was pleased to see, this morning, that friend Williamson, of the Reporter, is trying to arouse our citizens to the propriety of making some effort to secure a portion of the coal trade.

Our capitalists seem to need something to arouse them to a sense of their duty to themselves and our town in this particular. Before the canal was completed we had a number of town meetings; speeches were made upon the subject, and plans were proposed for its accommodation, and every one seemed to be alive to the importance of the subject.

But since its completion quite a change has come over us; instead of that interest formerly manifested, we are content to fold our arms in indifference, and see boat after boat, to the number of twenty to fifty per week, heavily laden with the article, pass by us and land their rich cargoes in Alexandria.

This is to be regretted, not simply on account of the coal and other produce they bring into the market, but the large amount of merchandise they purchase and take away with them; for it is a fact, and one that may not be known to our merchants generally, that the most of these boats take back with them, for different points on the canal, from one to twenty tons of merchandise of different kinds.

Keep the matter before our citizens, Mr. Reporter, until they are brought to act in the premises, and not let the time for making provision for a golden harvest pass by unimproved.

At Forrest Hall to-night the Young Men's Dramatic Association intend giving another of their rich entertainments, and I have no doubt that to-night's performance will far surpass any that has preceded it.
