OH WONDERFUL!—The New York Herald out for Clay and Webster for President and Vice President.—We quote the following article from a late number of the Herald, confessing ourselves so completely bewildered by the new lights that are reflected from it, and the new political impulses it has received, that we cannot bring our judgment to bear upon any of its seeming vagaries.

Voice from Ashland.—Mr. Clay.—This venerable and patriotic statesman occupies a position, in our judgment, by far the most exalted and enviable of any man now living. After a long life devoted to his country, and to the service of his beloved country, and commanding from the first hour of his debut in public life, that powerful influence which great abilities, united with pure patriotism, will ever secure, he is now seen, at the age of three-score years and ten, in retirement beneath the shades of Ashland, a glorious exemplar for republican statesmen. We would not exchange the dazzling fame of the warrior Wellington, nor the scholastic celebrity of Brougham, or Guizot, or of Humboldt—now the most exalted of the celebrities of the old world—for the unflinching labors of renown which this noble hero has undergone in the foremost of the living statesmen of America, as he is beheld in his retreat in Kentucky. We have, to-day, been favored with the perusal of a letter from him to a young gentleman of this city, dated June 30, 1851, treating of a variety of topics.

We regret that the recipient of the letter will not permit its publication, it being a private epistle to a devoted personal friend, and written in all the confidence and freedom that characterize such epistles, and breathing the loftiest sentiments of honor and unselfish patriotism. Upon the subject of the present state of the country, owing to the conduct of the Abolitionists, Mr. Clay says:

"I should be glad to witness a termination of the violence, both at the North and South, which threatens—in words, if not in fact—the existence of our Union. But my confidence is strong that the Union will be maintained against all assailants, in whatever quarter they may appear."

Mr. Clay contemplates remaining in the quiet of his home till the assembling of the Senate again calls him to his public duties. He writes: "I have been so much from home during the last eighteen months, that I believe I shall not visit the East this summer, agreeable and happy as it might be. I expect to remain at home, in as quiet a manner as I can here enjoy, and take care of my health."

The handwriting of Mr. Clay is steady, firm, and vigorous. So even, smooth, and indeed beautiful is it, that we venture the assertion that there is not a clerk in this city who can equal, much less excel it, in the characteristics which should distinguish the chirography of the gentleman, scholar, and apt and correct business man. What a grand and glorious spectacle it would be, to see the American people, in 1852, with an accord discarding all the fidgety aspirants and intrigants of all parties, and calling him—as the Romans called the old patriot, Cincinnatus—to the chief magistracy of this mighty Confederacy.
