

FOREIGN NEWS.—The steamer Arctic arrived at New York this morning. The leading items of the news she brings will be found under our telegraphic head.

The Gardiner Claim. We cannot suffer this Administration to wink the Gardiner Claim out of sight, and thus leave it as a legacy to be overhauled by Congress. If President Fillmore intends to keep away, with a portion of his Cabinet, all the season, he must deputize such Cabinet ministers as remain at their official posts to carry on rigorously the business of finding out all that can be found out relative to the true character of the Gardiner Claim.

We rely much upon Secretary Corwin in this matter. He is at his post now, and doubtless knows as much about the Gardiner Claim, and also the Mears Claim, as anybody else. We shall expect him, then, as he is an honest and upright man, and the Secretary of the Treasury, to make a clean breast of it, for the enlightenment of the people, who have been made to believe that they have, in some way, been swindled out of more than six hundred thousand dollars, by the awards on the Gardiner and Mears Claims.

Dr. Gardiner is expected to arrive in the next steamer from Europe. Letters have been received from him by the Hon. Philip B. Fendall, United States District Attorney for this District, and the Hon. Edward Curtis of New York, in which Dr. Gardiner expresses a willingness to return to the United States, and attend to the matters charged against him, and if his correspondents on this side of the Atlantic deem it necessary for him to do so. He had, however, only seen what was contained in the New York Herald of the 5th of July, when he wrote, and his impression then was that the storm would soon blow over, and there would be no necessity for his immediate return to the United States. But the receipt of later intelligence may have induced him to change his mind and his steps.

If he returns here, we shall expect that he and Mr. Secretary Corwin will come before the public, under their own proper signatures, and not by proxy, nor by employed letter-writers, with a clear, plain and unvarnished statement of all the leading facts in the matter of the Gardiner Claim, and the Mears Claim, and the manner in which both of said claims were prosecuted to a successful award.

The public will be glad to know all about the following points in the matter, to wit:

1. Whether George Law, esq., the Steam Mail millionaire, who purchased Governor Corwin's interest in the Mexican Claims, gave \$100,000 (the price which the referees, Messrs. John Young and James S. Thayer, adjudged said interest to be nominally worth,) or only what would be left of that sum, after a deduction of twenty-one per centum and interest, say \$80,000.

2. If Mr. Law forked over the \$100,000 in cash, who pocketed that part of it which Mr. Secretary Corwin did not get?

3. Did Mr. Law purchase all of Gov. Corwin's interest in the Mexican claims, as counsel and owner, or only his interest as counsel?

4. Did Gov. Corwin alone, or with his cousin, purchase one quarter of the Gardiner Claim, with money obtained from Mr. Corcoran, the banker, on a loan at six per cent. interest; and if so, was all, or any portion of said loan, advanced to Dr. Gardiner before Gov. Corwin went into the Treasury Department?

5. As Dr. Gardiner went to Mexico twice to complete the vouchers for his claim, and probably received an advance each time to bear his expenses, was not one of his trips at least made after Gov. Corwin went into the Treasury Department?

6. If Gov. Corwin did not sell out to Mr. Law his entire interest in the Mexican claims, as political counsel and as part owner, by purchase of the Gardiner Claim, then was he not interested as part owner of the Gardiner Claim, while he was Secretary of the Treasury?

These points and mysteries we feel sure Mr. Secretary Corwin will fully and entirely clear up. It is due from him to the public, whose trusted servant he is. It is due from him to the Whig party, through whose success and power he has been enabled to reach his present exalted position.

We trust he will be ready and willing to clear up everything so far as his own conduct is concerned, and not leave any mystery for Congress to ferret out and expose, to the injury of the Whig party, like the ever-to-be-remembered Galpin swindle.

We trust that, if Dr. Gardiner has deposited \$230,000 in this city, there will be no unwillingness, on the part of any one concerned, to tell where and with whom said money is deposited?

Until Mr. Carlos Gardiner needed bail in the sum of \$8,000, nobody seemed to know that there had been \$10,000 deposited to his credit in this city, by his brother, Dr. Gardiner. If Court had fixed the bail at three or four times that amount, there are persons uncharitable enough, as the case now stands, to believe the sum required would have been deposited to the credit of the person needing it.

Hence, we say, the mysteries in the whole matter ought to be, if they can be, forthwith cleared up. We expect and call upon Mr. Secretary Corwin to do it. Silence will not suffice.
