Alderman Souldan has not been admitted to a seat in Parliament, as stated in our telegraphic despatch. He was excluded by a majority of sixty. Baron Rothschild was excluded by thirty-three votes.

ARRIVAL OF THE PROMETHEUS. Interesting from California. NEW YORK, August 13-1 1/2 p. m.

The steamer Prometheus has arrived, from San Juan on the fourth, with San Francisco dates to July 15.

She brings three hundred and sixty passengers, and two hundred thousand dollars in cash as freight, and one hundred thousand in the hands of passengers.

The Pacific left San Francisco on the 15th, and arrived at San Juan on the 29th. The passengers had fifteen miles of land carriage, and thence by steamer across Nicaragua lake and down San Juan river. Thirty-two of her passengers express great satisfaction at the new route.

The only event exciting any interest at San Francisco was the trial and execution, by the Vigilant Committee, of a desperate character named James Stuart, at two o'clock on the 11th of July, at the end of the Market wharf, in the presence of five thousand citizens, who, it is alleged, "were compelled to act on their own behalf, as the laws were inadequate and their administration inefficient."

The execution of Stuart created great excitement, and the conduct of the committee was severely reprobated by the Court, city authorities, &c.; but the people generally sustain the committee.

[Second Despatch.] Two and a half p. m.—The vicinity of Rogue's river and Klamath river is infested by hostile Indians, well armed, who are committing numerous murders.

They are also troublesome in the Sacramento Valley, and refuse to meet the Commissioners; who are without funds to prosecute their mission.

The Mormons are making a decided movement towards establishing a direct communication from Salt Lake to the Pacific.

The mining intelligence continues extremely encouraging.

The effects of the late fire are disappearing, and the burned district is pretty thickly studded with settlements. Numerous substantial brick stores and other buildings are going up in different parts of the city.

The agricultural prospects are extremely good.

Political affairs are attracting great attention. Three parties are in the field; Independents, Democrats, and Whigs.

The markets are generally overstocked and unchanged.

Seamen's wages rather lower, carpenters' do. ten dollars per day; laborers' do. five. Money is plenty.

BOSTON, Aug. 12.—The bark Downing from Pernambuco, with dates to the 14th, has arrived. She reports that preparations were making for war with Buenos Ayres, and troops were being sent forward. Military men believed there would be no actual fighting. Business was dull. The bark W. C. Wright, of Baltimore, was dismantled when a few days out from Pernambuco, and put into Parabo for repairs. A flour dealer failed in Boston to-day for \$25,000.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—The Washington sailed to-day with 90 passengers and \$8,000 in specie. Some villain attempted, yesterday, to throw the passenger train on the Pennsylvania and Ohio Railroad off the track, between Rochester and Brighton, by fastening an iron chain across the track. A fireman, fortunately, and the engineer immediately checked the engine, which, however, was upset and somewhat damaged. No lives were lost.

NEW BEDFORD, August 11.—In Westport, near this place, the tempest on Saturday last was almost unprecedented. Full grown trees, fences, stone walls, cornfields, &c., were leveled to the ground. Not only glass, but window frames were destroyed by the hail. In this place the storm was very severe, the rain falling in torrents; but no serious damage was done.

BURLINGTON, (Vt.) August 11.—The body of Burdick Sprague, of Morristown, missing for two years past, has been found in Lake Memphramung with the throat cut. The body was in a remarkable state of preservation, so as to be at once recognized by his friends. Sprague is said to have been wealthy, and was undoubtedly murdered. The discovery has caused much excitement.
