From the New York Sun.

The history of the British "South Sea Bubble" is pregnant with instruction to the multitudes who are unwilling to earn their bread by the "sweat of their brow," but hope to obtain wealth by some sudden stroke of fortune.

In 1711 the debt of Great Britain amounted to nearly \$50,000,000. A company of merchants took this debt upon themselves, government agreeing to pay them interest upon it for a certain time. The monopoly of the trade to the Pacific, then called the South Seas, was granted to them, and they were incorporated under the name of "the South Sea Company."

At this time the most visionary ideas were held of the vast riches of Western America. Glorious tales of the inexhaustible treasures of the gold and silver mines of Peru and Mexico captivated the imaginations of the English people. They thought that it was only necessary to send cargoes of cotton and woolen goods to the coast to be repaid a hundred fold, in gold and silver ingots, by the natives.

The company, then, which had the exclusive right to this lucrative traffic could not fail to rise rapidly in public favor, and all pressed forward to secure a share of the coming wealth.

The most extravagant rumors were circulated by interested persons. Treaties with Spain were spoken of to further the interests of the company. Mexico was to empty her gold mines into the voracious bosom of England, and silver would become as plentiful as iron.

Every hundred pounds invested with the company would produce hundreds yearly to the lucky stockholder. Some opposition was made to the scheme, in Parliament, by far-sighted statesmen; but the maddening infatuation had infected even that body, and the patronage of government was eventually secured.

The whole nation turned stockjobbers. Exchange alleys were blocked up by crowds, and the vicinity was impassable from the number of carriages.

In order to fan the flame and make it a source of still greater profit, the company would declare large dividends, and then immediately open their books for new subscriptions. Such was the frantic eagerness of all ranks to speculate in these funds, that in a few hours of one day nearly forty millions of dollars were subscribed for stock representing only eight millions.

The inordinate thirst for gain infected all classes of society. Hundreds of new stock companies sprung up like Jonah's gourd, and, like it, perished in a night. Many thousands invested their whole fortunes with the South Sea Company. Widows and orphans possessing annuities exchanged them for its stock.

This continued rising in value till it reached a premium of one thousand per cent. The bubble was then full blown, and ready to burst. Utter ruin was impending over half the nation.

The alarm was given when it was understood that the most prominent managers had sold out their own shares. A general panic followed. Every effort to restore confidence proved fruitless, and within eight months from the time of its creation, this monstrous fabric of fraud, credulity and infatuation had fallen forever.

Its crafty directors had amassed immense wealth, by selling out when the fever was at its height. When the bubble burst there were notes of the company in circulation to the amount of more than one thousand millions of dollars. The consternation was indescribable—the rage of the swindled people intense beyond description.

Hundreds of families were ruined—the wealthy became beggars—and the working classes lost their hard earnings through the bankruptcy of their employers. Multitudes saw starvation staring them in the face. The voice of woe and imprecation resounded throughout the land.

Parliament was immediately summoned, and the members declaimed with much warmth. Lord Moleworth declared, "that he looked upon the contrivance and execution of the willow South Sea scheme as the perdition of their country; and he should be satisfied to see them tied in sacks, and thrown into the Thames." But the government was itself by no means free from guilt.

Two ministers of state, several members of parliament, and many of the nobility were deeply implicated. The Prince of Wales had cleared immense sums by his speculations. Investigations into the affairs of the company disclosed scenes of infamy, and instances of fraud and corruption disgraceful alike to the morals of the offenders and to the intellects of their dupes.

Parliament afforded a partial relief to the general distress by wresting from the delinquents a portion of their ill-gotten gains, and dividing it among the sufferers. But it was long before public credit was restored, and the South Sea Bubble remains the greatest example in history of commercial gambling—a striking warning to those who would "make haste to be rich."
