A CLEVER BUSINESS.

FOUR YEARS BUSINESS EXPERIENCE IN WICHITA.

A Busy Planning Mill Owned and Operated by Mr. E. C. Hartzell—Increasing Capacity.

NEW enterprises in the city have been more successful than the planning mill owned and operated by Mr. E. C. Hartzell, located on Douglas avenue, near Washington street.

Instead of "prospecting tour" it was his "locating tour." He had not taken him long to catch on to Wichita and fully understanding that in order to do business it was first necessary to be where there was business, he was not long in concluding to locate in business.

Mr. Hartzell's business has been confined mostly to Wichita but whenever the business in his line was a little quiet in the city he always knew of something in his line in surrounding towns and would then take a train at night and be on hand to talk business next morning to the fellow who was going to have some work done.

Within a few days after deciding to locate here he selected the site for his plant. At that time it was in the suburbs, most conspicuously in the suburbs of the business circle.

The power for the plant is furnished by a twenty-five horse engine, supplied with steam by a fifty horse boiler. In the list of machinery is a twenty-five inch planer; band saw eight feet ten inches high, and one of the largest in the city; two rip saws; cut off saw; boring machine and planing machine; "whittler" or shaper, but it is a machine very much different from the usual store box "whittler." It makes much less noise and does considerably more work and offers less explanation and suggestions about the national banking system.

Mr. Hartzell employs fifteen hands and rarely over business is such that he runs at less than full capacity. The room which was to be added will provide more bench room and allow more machinery and which will enable him to employ twenty hands.

LIVE STOCK AND GRAIN.

The late editions of the EAGLE illustrating the live stock and grain markets of Wichita seem to have had a wonderful stimulating effect. Yesterday was the banner day in the history of the live stock market and one of the biggest the city ever witnessed in the grain market.

The receipts of corn and oats of J. W. Hawn & Co. today is about sixty-five cars, and the largest they have ever had. This, together with 3,612 hogs and 346 cattle on the live stock market, means a great deal for Wichita, and the day's business in money amounts to about \$48,000, a large part of which goes into the pockets of the farmers and stock raisers of southwestern Kansas.

AN INVENTION FOR CATTLE SHIPPERS.

A very novel and ingenious invention has recently been brought out in this city which will fill a long felt want among stock shippers. For years the cruel prod pole has been in use, consisting of a common hard wood pole with an iron hook in the end from one-fourth to one-half inch long, when cattle are to be loaded aboard stock cars this is used to force and hurry the animals forward.

THE BOSS TRAIN.

The incoming freight train on the Wichita & Western railroad yesterday afternoon consisted of fifty-two cars loaded with grain, live stock and other products of the country through which the road passes between this city and Pratt.

SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICERS.

A Convention of School Officers and Friends was held in the Board of Trade yesterday.

SHERIFF CROSS MURDER TRIAL.

Attorney Thomas F. McMechan returned yesterday morning from Paris, Texas, having been absent from the city for several weeks attending to legal business in that territory and at Paris. The Howard case wherein the prisoner is charged with the killing of Wm. Main in No Man's Land, in December, 1888, will come up in Paris fifteen days hence and Attorney McMechan has been looking up the evidence for the defense.

FOR INCENDIARISM.

Yesterday before Judge Mueller, Mrs. Roberts was arraigned on a charge of setting fire to her residence on the West Side, and given a preliminary hearing. The charge for the prosecution was submitted and the court bound the prisoner over to the district court in the sum of \$1,000.
