



THANKSGIVING DAY. The thermometer of yesterday was severely castigating of giving to the poor heavy winter clothing but donations to the hospitals and to the more unfortunate classes of people were in order and charitable Wichita seems to have broken the record. The appeals for aid were most liberally responded to, in not more so than ever before. The poor as well as others more fortunate in worldly affairs happy. Business was practically suspended, and the day most appropriately observed. The union services of the churches were well attended.

Union services, all the West Side churches, were held at the Danes avenue Presbyterian church. Rev. Shantz, the pastor, led the congregation in the introductory service, after a voluntary anthem from the choir. He read the sixty-eighth Psalm and invocation was made by Rev. Patton, of Derby. The sermon was delivered by Rev. L. W. Bicknell from the text of 'I will praise the name of God with a song and will magnify Him with thanksgiving; this also shall please the Lord better than an ox'—Ps. 68:30,31.

After referring to the involution, the impetuous and the exultant features of this marvelous poem of David the speaker turned to the people and the condition of today. Said he: If this world were flat, as some of the early fathers—even this side of the flood—believed, we should reckon this part of it the center. And we should perhaps wonder that nations all around us, having wars and emotions continually, do not invade our borders and cross our fair land on the other side, but we have not been invaded. Being of peace, then, with all the rest of earth we have great reason to praise God with songs of rejoicing and offer unto Him thanksgiving, and is the greatest reward in good, whether it be individual or national. So that true, useful character both of the individual and of the nation must be based upon a recognition of God, of Divine Law. Nations have their character to maintain and well as individuals, and under constitutional government where all classes participate in the exercise of political power the national character will necessarily depend more upon the moral qualities of the many than of the few. So that the same qualities that determine the character of individuals also determine the character of nations. Hence the need of educating the masses and lifting them to a higher social and intellectual plane and of disseminating caste, or class society.

One of the greatest blessings for which we as a people should be devoutly thankful in this country is the personal liberty, the freedom of thought and action that is enjoyed by all.

At the Reformed church, corner of Topeka avenue and Lewis street, interesting union Thanksgiving services were held. All the pastors south of Douglas avenue and east of the Santa Fe railroad took part in the devotional services, and a goodly number of their people were present, as that the attendance was large. The offering was \$1108, and was divided between the Wichita hospital and the Children's Home. Rev. R. L. Marsh preached a very excellent and instructive sermon, of which the following is a brief outline:

Text.—'What is the Lord's year?' Strength. 'Neh. VIII, 10 Two questions: 'What is Thanksgiving day?' 2. What ought we to make it?

First.—What is it? It stands in honor and honored age, dating from Gov. Bradford's appointment of a day of Thanksgiving after the first harvest of the New England colonies in 1771.

2. Its character is that indicated by the text. It is a day not of fasting, but of feasting—not for intemperance in indulging the flesh, but in gratitude and joyfully using the good things of God, and recognizing His mercies.

Second.—What ought we to make the day? 1. A day of special thought upon God's mercies which are profitably recounted and contemplated in detail. But not a mere day of feasting, but an occasion of making formal expression of the spirit of gratitude which ought to characterize us throughout the year. Gratitude implies a recognition of God's goodness, and thus a sense of dependence upon Him, and so is the true spirit of the Christian constantly. We have the best

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
