

every case beyond recognition. In fully half the cases identification was only possible from either the clothes or the contents of the pockets.

There are two encouraging facts which give the rescuers on their work. No fire followed the explosion—at least there have been no signs of any, and there are no bodies which could be seen through the tunnels behind fallen boulders.

The wreck about the mouth of the mine and the bottom of the hoisting shaft is so nearly complete that the work is dreadfully slow. All the bodies in plain view have been brought to the surface, but there are others which cannot be seen until hidden under fallen boulders and masses of debris.

The cause of the explosion is still undetermined. The probability is that some miner fired a blast without orders, which ignited either the accumulated gas or coal dust. There is no means of learning the cause now, and there may never be, unless some of the survivors can be rescued.

The different miners' organizations met tonight to arrange the details of the funeral of the dead.

At 10 o'clock tonight forty-eight bodies had been rescued from the mine. The names of more of the victims are as follows: George Lewey, August Feita, John Williams, L. Hunt, Robert Powers, William Mitchell, Joseph K. Knowlton, McShane, Timothy Collins, James Farmer.

Among the fatally injured are: George Harlin, Sr., George Harlin, Jr., Frank Hathaway, Joseph H. Harlin, Frank White, William Williams, Chas. Martin, Louis Toole, Joseph Toole, Giovanni Blesanti, Francis Toole, Brany Biemo and John Harlin.

Those who first went down the hoisting shaft after the explosion describe the scene as terribly revolting. Legs arms and headless bodies were all about, and the bottom of the shaft and scattered all over the various approaches. Twenty-four bodies were found at the point, but only six of them could be identified.

It has been learned that the explosion was caused by George Lowrey exploding what is known as a "window shot." The latest estimate of the number of missing is 149.

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 8.—Allan Bray (known as "Red") was today for killing Mrs. Prather, wife of a planter.


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MACON, Ga., Jan. 8.—Sol Rowe and Bob Richards were hanged today at Morgan, Calhoun county, for rioting in 1882.
