

The Knights Templar are preparing for a grand banquet on Feb. 29. A hunting party returned Wednesday from the territory, where they succeeded in killing three deer.

Revel meetings are still progressing at the Methodist church, and during the past three weeks quite a number of conversions have been made. Let the good work go on. The late heavy rains in this portion of the state have had a wonderful effect upon the growing wheat. Farmers are claiming that the prospects are good for twenty bushels to the acre. Business in every branch of industry is growing brighter in this locality. In the last thirty days many farms have been sold to eastern farmers and stockmen, and in the last week, since there are no more desirable homes to rent, a number of city properties have changed hands. Considerable business has been done in the territory in business in the result.

Bacon Corps No. 168 is the name of the Woman's Relief corps organized at Bluff City last Saturday. Twenty charter members were installed by Mrs. M. G. Pumphrey and a number of other ladies of this city.

POLITICAL POINTS.

ALLIANCE VIEWS OF THE CORDAGE TRUST EXPOSURE.

The Senator From Kansas Afraid That the Brethren Were Played for Suckers.

The Editor of the National Economist Unable to Discover Anything Wrong in the Proposed Scheme.

The Hill Machine in New York Denounced by the Brooklyn Supporters of Cleveland—Senator Cullom of Illinois Defines His Position on the Silver Question—Major Morrill and the Kansas Governorship.

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—An Inter Ocean Washington special says that President Polk, when shown the Inter Ocean exposure of the Cordage trust, said: "In February last Oswald Wilson came to me and unfolded a scheme for the Alliance's entering into business relations with the National Union company. I refused to recommend it at the time or on any occasion subsequent to it. Since that time the company has used my name in their circulars. I wrote to the president of the company, calling his attention to the fact that my name was being used without my personal consent, and received a reply that the matter would be inquired into and rectified, but it has not been done."

Senator Peffer glanced over the Inter Ocean article and said: "Whether the Inter Ocean article is founded on fact or not, I am not inclined to dispute. It is quite possible that some of the Alliance people have been overreached. It would be strange if they had not."

"The truth of the matter," continued Senator Peffer, "is that the Alliance is beset on every side by alleged business philanthropists, who are rich with promises to aid the farmer—by enlarging his bank account and making his life one continual round of pleasure. Then, again, men come from the Alliance who are here for revenue only. The latter will persist in lying down with the lion, in spite of all that can be done, and with the usual result. I do not think that the Alliance will authorize an investigation of the Inter Ocean's charges, and I do not think either that the Alliance is going to be captured by the National Cordage trust, or that the farmer will furnish its goods cheaper than any other firm here. No objection to the Alliance dealing with them. I do not understand it to be proved that any company was contemplated between the Alliance and the National Union company. The farmer is in great distress. He sees combines in all directions. He is not a man to be deceived. He is naturally suspicious that the way to help himself and to improve his condition is to combine also. This is probably one of the reasons why Alliance men joined hands with the National Union company."

Dr. Macoun, when seen by the Inter Ocean correspondent, said: "I was for meeting at Cretin's hotel, and I went to that meeting determined to probe the scheme of the National Union company to the bottom. I am firm enough to say that, after hearing the plan and investigating the company itself, I saw no bar in the way of the Alliance's accepting its terms. What the farmer wants is to buy what he needs at the lowest possible market price and sell what he has to sell at the highest market price. I think that the National Union company is all right. It is a business proposition. The Alliance made a narrow escape from getting into the clutches of a gigantic trust; but the scheme, happily, was discovered in time. The National Union company met in convention last November in Indianapolis and the National Union company went under. In my opinion there were no other parties in the Alliance who were not in the Alliance for a consideration in this matter, and because I feared that their schemes and exposed them, they have followed me with deadly enemies ever since."

"The Indianapolis convention discussed for a whole day the proposition as to whether the Alliance should endorse the combine with the National Union company, and at the conclusion sat down on it so hard that it has not shown any vitality since. Had this combination been consummated through, some persons had considered that it should, what a spectacle the Alliance, with its motto of 'Death to combines,' would have presented to the people of the world. The National Union company's name is 'Denial,' to use a common expression, so far as the Alliance is concerned, and no one need vex themselves because they fear that the order has fallen into the hands of knaves and fools."

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 12.—The Pennsylvania club, a semi-political organization of this city, tonight celebrated Abraham Lincoln's birthday by a dinner. The principal guests were Attorney General Miller, Senator General Tull and United States Senator Gallagher of New Hampshire. When the dinner was reached, President Garrison proposed the first toast, 'Abraham Lincoln.' C. Stuart Patterson, dean of the law school of the university of Pennsylvania, was the chief speaker.

At the conclusion of Mr. Patterson's speech Attorney General Miller arose and spoke to the toast 'The Present Administration.' Mr. Miller is the early part of his address said: "Of the chief executive of the manner in which he maintained the dignity and honor of his office, the rights of his people abroad; of the general policy of his administration on domestic affairs; of the character of his state papers, the question of his personal appointments, his fidelity to personal and party pledges, and to the execution of all the laws; his astounding grasp of all questions arising in every department of government—in short, of the lead of the administration, I shall not speak. My theme is more modest."

Mr. Miller then proceeded to review the leading achievements of the various governmental departments under Mr. Harrison's administration. In conclusion he said: "We make no excuses for our apologies, ask no suspension of judgment. We say, 'Investigate, scrutinize, take our word for nothing, but far off or near at hand, with glass or naked eye, examine what has been done in great and little things, and on such an examination pass judgment on the claims that President Harrison is giving the country as honest, capable, patriotic and business administration.'"

THE ANTI-OPTIONS BILLS.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 12.—A letter was sent to the Tennessee representative in congress today, which states that at a meeting of the board of representatives of the Memphis cotton exchange, the Washburn, Hatch and Peffer bill, defining 'options' and 'utures,' now pending in congress, were given a careful consideration, and were fully discussed, and that the board was unanimously of the opinion that the passage of either of these bills would seriously damage the commercial and producing interests of the country. The letter, in conclusion, earnestly requests Tennessee's representatives to lead their opposition to all bills looking to the prevention of dealing in 'utures' and 'options,' if after an examination of the question they can consistently do so.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—John A. McCall, congressman of the Equitable Life Assurance society, and formerly state superintendent of insurance, was duly and unanimously elected president of the New York Life Insurance company at a meeting of the trustees today. The meeting was brief and harmonious.
