KEYSTONE DEMOCRATS.

HARRISBURG, Pa., April 13.-The delegates to the Democratic state convention were called to order at noon. The lower floor of the opera house was filled up by the 463 delegates and the two galleries were packed full of spectators.

Congressman Beltzhoover was nominated for temporary chairman and was elected unanimously. During the course of his speech Mr. Beltzhoover said: "The name of Grover Cleveland is enshrined in the affections of all intelligent, virtuous and substantial citizens of the republic."

Mr. Beltzhoover's reference to Grover Cleveland and Governor Pattison was received with cheers, long continued. One individual in the gallery shouted "What is the matter with Hill, but only groans and hisses followed the mention of the name of the New York leader."

Next came the report of the committee on resolutions, which, after a lengthy discussion, was adopted. The platform pledges anew the fealty of Pennsylvania Democrats to Democrat principles as taught and practised by Thomas Jefferson, Andrew Jackson, Samuel J. Tilden and Grover Cleveland.

That the paramount reform now demanded of the federal legislature is a reform of the tariff laws upon the basis of the Democratic national platform of 1888. That the best interests of the country demand the nomination and election of Grover Cleveland as president, and to the end that the vote and influence of Pennsylvania may be the most effectively heard and felt, the delegates this day chosen are directed to act as a unit in all matters entrusted to their charge, and action to be determined by a vote of the majority of the delegates.

TEXAS WHITE REPUBLICANS. DALLAS, Tex., April 13.—The "City White" Republican convention elected a permanent organization and nominated the following tickets: Governor, Andrew Jackson Houston; Dallas, Lieutenant Governor, J. P. Newton; San Antonio, comptroller, J. D. Schmidt; Denton, treasurer, R. B. Beer; Harris county, attorney general, Walter Davis; El Paso, delegates to the Minneapolis convention, also were selected. The platform approved to the white Republicans of Texas to form a separate party in Texas from its present connection with the national condition favors the present tariff, and depreciates the force bill.

MICHIGAN REPUBLICANS.

DETROIT, April 13.—The hotels are crowded tonight with delegates to the Republican state convention. The state central committee held a meeting tonight to arrange the program for tomorrow. It has been formally decided to test the constitutionality of the Miner law of the last Democratic legislature, and the convention tomorrow will ignore this legislation and nominate two presidential electors at large, as has been done from time immemorial. In addition to this, each congressional district caucus will be expected to select one elector and report his name to the state convention at the same time.

VERMONT REPUBLICANS. MONTPELIER, Vt., April 13.—The Republican state convention to select delegates to the Minneapolis convention was held here today. The platform adopted recognizes the well known principles that have guided the Republican party in its illustrious career, and the safety of action for the government of its future policy; that Vermont Republicans regard protection for American industries, an honest dollar and an honest trade, the leading considerations deserving of continued and earnest national endorsement, and endorse the administration of President Harrison.

KANSAS DELEGATES. HORTON, Kan., April 13.—The Republican convention of the central district met today and elected Cy Leland of Troy and S. H. Kiley of Atchison delegates to the Minneapolis convention. Leland and Kiley were elected by a vote of 20 to 10. The delegates to the state convention of Pottawatomie were chosen alternates. Judge H. M. Allen of Leavenworth was chosen elector.

UNEASY POLITICIANS. CHICAGO, April 13.—Civil service commissioner Roosevelt today caused a sensation among politicians here by starting an active investigation of the infractions of the law prohibiting the solicitation of campaign funds from federal officeholders. It is said that two Republican national committee men are concerned.

HARRISON INDORSED. REED CITY, Mich., April 13.—Resolutions strongly favoring Harrison's administration were adopted at the Republican congressional convention of the Eleventh district.

The Big Four Withdraws from the Central Traffic Association.

CHICAGO, April 13.—The stormiest meeting of the Central Traffic association that has been held for twenty years ended tonight. The most important outcome of the lively discussion that had been going on all day was a notice given by Traffic Manager Murray of the Big Four that his road desired immediately to withdraw from the association. The notice received the association split was the question whether grain rates should be reduced from Chicago and kindred junction points to the seaboard. Peoria lines were especially anxious for a reduction, to meet the cut rates of the lake and rail lines and the matings of some of the all-rail routes that they came into the meeting with the demand that some action be taken to afford immediate relief.
