ITALIANS HEAD THE LIST.
Comparative Wealth of Immigrants Land-
ing at Castle Garden.

Col. Farrell, an official of the immigra-
tion bureau in New York, has made a
close study of the immigration question
in all its phases, not only because it is
his business, but for the reason that he
is a humanitarian. In speaking of the
immigration to a New York Press re-
porter, he said: "The immigration of
this year will be greatly in excess of
that of 1891, when 445,290 aliens were
landed in this port. From present in-
dications it is safe to surmise that 600-
000 passengers will be received this
year, notwithstanding that a most care-
ful examination is made of every pas-
senger before landing. A feature of
immigration is the extraordinary diver-
sity of the characteristics of those com-
ing to these shores. This year almost
every section and every religion of the
habitable globe is represented, bringing
with them the habits and customs of
their native homes.

"I have been looking into the amount
of money brought here by all classes of
immigrants and I find that the average
per capita of the Italians over twenty
years of age is \$96.51. Hungarians are
the next on the list, the per capita be-
ing \$86.91. The Pole's per capita is
\$11.70; Finlander's, \$12.23; Irish, \$19.52;
Austrian's, \$19.29; Austrian's, \$18.00;
Norwegian's, \$18.29; Swedish's, \$23.32;
Bohemian's, \$23.02; Turk's, \$23.02;
Nederlander's, \$23.67; Russian's, \$23.38;
English, \$28.00; Scotch, \$28.08; Dane's,
\$29.23; Belgian's, \$30.44; Armenian's,
\$32.01; German's, \$35.66; Swiss, \$37.78;
Welsh, \$49.91; Greece, \$44.00; Spaniard's,
\$76.31, and French, \$78.23. The per
capita of other countries is \$33.45. The
general impression is that all immi-
grants who come to the United States
are very poor, yet some of those who
seek American shores carry 'wads'
which would make the mouths of many
Wall Street brokers water to look at.
I remember one instance where an old
man, dressed so poorly that it was being
considered whether he ought to be
barred or not, on being asked how
much money he had pulled an old
leather pocketbook from underneath his
tattered shirt and showed a roll of \$5,000
in cash. Besides the ready money, he
had drafts for twice as much more."

Ships That Never Return.
Sea captains were yarning about
ships which never returned and various
dangers of the deep, when a Thomaston
mariner related an experience which,
he declared, made his hair rise every
time he thought of it. He said: "One
trip I made from New York to San
Francisco is very distinctly impressed
upon my mind. We had in a general
cargo, including seventy tons of gun-
powder and some railroad iron. We
had a very rough passage around the
Horn and were tossed about pretty
roughly for a week or so. I could hear
the vessel straining and the cargo
groaning and grinding and it made me
pretty nervous. I can tell you. When
we reached San Francisco and dis-
charged, I found that thirty tons of the
powder had been stowed on the rail-
road iron. Some of the packages had
been broken open by the working of
the cargo and the iron was covered
with powder. We saw a general
haze of it and—well, I felt sick to
think what might have happened."

CRUSHED BY A WALL.
HARTFORD, Conn., Aug. 11.—This
afternoon a heavy stone wall in the tank
room of the Hartford City Glass works
fell in, caused by defective masonry.
Five laborers were killed. They are W. H.
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six to eight months.

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SOUTHAMPTON, Aug. 11.—The North

were not altered.

THE EIGHT-HOUR LAW.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Officers of the
government, charged with making con-
tracts have been studying the law passed by
congress the other day limiting the hours
of daily service of laborers and mechanics
employed upon the work of the government,
and they are not altogether pleased
with its provisions. It limits the hours
of work absolutely to eight in any one
calendar day, and it is not lawful for any
contractor or sub-contractor to require or
permit any laborer or mechanic to work
more than eight hours in any calendar
day, except in case of extraordinary emer-
gency. The government is to be the sole
judge of when such an emergency exists.
It is pointed out that this will work
great hardship on contractors who
must be obliged to employ more men, all
with the same engine or other
source of power. It will be neces-
sary, if they desire to work
more than eight hours in any calendar
day, to shut down part of their establish-
ment every day earlier than the rest of it.
They will not be permitted to work the
men overtime and pay them extra, but
they must stop exactly at the expiration
of the eight hours. It is
thought one effect of this will be to con-
centrate much of the government work
in a few establishments where little outside
work will be done, and where the regular
hours for the entire establishment will be
eight per day, and that this will
add greatly to the cost of most govern-
ment work, and will also greatly delay
such work as shipbuilding, where it will
be a hindrance, for many of the private
necessary machinery for the contractors to
make any material increase in the number
of men employed.

The law does not apply to any contracts
already made, but it will govern all future
contracts, and it is estimated that the
additional cost to the government on work
of a kind, involving the use of private
contractors, has been entered into, and it is seen
that the contractors figure out additional cost
of the work to them. When the navy de-
partment gets ready to let the contract
for the armored cruiser and the battleship
provided for in the naval appropriation
bill passed at the session just ended,
an interesting comparison can be
made, as both these vessels are almost
exact reproductions of vessels now being
built, and the difference between the cost
of the new vessels and those already con-
tracted for will represent substantially
the increase in cost on account of the
eight-hour law.

ASSASSINATED.
RIVERSIDE, Cal., Aug. 11.—While Mrs.
Wall, wife of P. A. Wall, a prominent
merchant of Elsinore, was driving through
Temescal cañon today, accompanied by her
son, Ira, a young man named Elmer Wal-
ter stepped into the roadside and fired a
bullet into the breast of the lady. Mrs.
Ira Wall and badly wounding Mrs. Wall.
The news of the shooting caused much ex-
citement, and a posse was immediately
organized to search for the assassin. The
posse overtook near South Riverside and turned
over to the sheriff. There had been
considerable trouble between the Wall and
Walter families for some time past, and
the court proceedings resulted in a decision
in favor of the Walls.

NO TARIFF ON MONEY.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Special Agent
Hanson at Chicago has reported to the
treasury department that an Italian bank
in Chicago is importing through the mails
large quantities of Italian paper money for
sale to Italians to send to friends in Italy,
and of the currency of such importations
is subject to duty. Secretary Sherman
Cronse has replied to him that the money
in question is not subject to duty under
the tariff laws, but that the revenue laws
of the United States prohibit the importation
of English internal revenue stamps and Mexican
subsidy certificates on the ground
that they are not goods, wares or merchan-
dise within the meaning of the tariff laws.

the launching. The Marthafield is a twin-
screw torpedo cruiser. The torpedo outfit
will consist of six torpedo guns for
launching torpedoes. The battery will
consist of two six-inch breech-loading
guns, two four-inch long-barreled rifles,
one six-inch and one one-pound rapid
firing gun and two galling guns.
