The Friends of the Measure Fail to Secure the Adoption of the Proposed Closure Rule.

The New York Banks Draw Upon Their Gold Reserves to Assist the National Treasury Department.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Immediately after the reading and approval of the journal in the house today, Mr. Catchings of Missouri called up the resolution of the committee on rules, setting apart this legislative day and (if necessary) the next legislative day for the consideration of the bill repealing the Sherman silver act. The strong Democratic showing made in favor of the silver repeal bill, and all that prevented its adoption was the division on other than silver lines of the Republicans, many of whom believe that it is good policy to vote the silver bill.

The house then went into committee of the whole for the further consideration of the legislative appropriation bill. Amendments were adopted providing that hereafter no public building shall be draped in mourning, that the executive department shall not be closed out of respect to deceased officials, and prohibiting the use of public funds for the funeral expenses of government officials or employees.

Mr. Arnold moved to recommit the bill, with instructions to report it back with an amendment striking out the appropriation for the civil service commission.

Nor has the drain of gold stopped. Arrangements were made by foreign bankers today for the shipment of \$3,000,000 in gold next Saturday. Orders for shipments will probably be heard from tomorrow, and it was the impression in Wall street yesterday that this week's exports will reach about \$3,000,000. This would leave only a little over \$3,000,000 of free gold in the treasury, probably barely sufficient for a single week's supply. Since Monday afternoon a quiet and orderly market has gone up from \$4.87 1/2 to \$4.88, less commission.

George C. Williams, president of the New York Clearing House association, and also president of the Chemical National bank, spent a great deal of time yesterday arranging for a further loan of gold to the treasury. He went to several banks and appealed that, for the public good, they should join in circulating their gold reserves enough to keep up the supply of free gold in the treasury to meet all demands, until steps can be taken to otherwise meet the emergency. It is understood that the appeals were successful in all instances. A group of the banks had already advanced \$2,000,000 of gold last Friday to help meet the demand for the day's clearing.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Secretary Foster of the treasury department was shown the published statement this morning that he had not seen the report of the New York bank which supplied the treasury department with gold last week to meet the demand for foreign shipments. He would not wish to say anything further on the subject than that he had employed no one to investigate the matter. The report from the banks, about the further extension of gold this week, he would say nothing.

THE ACTION OF THE BANKS.
NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—The continued expectation that the treasury department had just forced the treasury department to view the situation with some uneasiness. Accordingly, Secretary Foster in an informal way conveyed to the associated banks of this city for their aid. In discussing the matter a member of the Clearing House association today said:

"As a result of this expressed desire, the clearing house committee on Tuesday authorized the chairman of the association to arrange a meeting of the clearing house large sums of gold to turn over enough to the sub-treasury to offset the withdrawal of gold for export last week. The result was that \$2,000,000 in gold was deposited and legal orders taken by the banks in exchange. This is not the limit of the assistance that will be given, but further sums of gold will be turned in as desired by Secretary Foster. The clearing house committee will probably meet tomorrow to take further action in regard to a definite policy, and a conference of bankers may also be held to discuss the question."

It was reported that the banks assisting the treasury would send \$300,000 each to the treasury today. President Williams of the Chemical bank said that the report was true. "The object, of course," said Mr. Williams, "is to keep the treasury from the necessity of cutting into the \$100,000,000 reserve. The treasury now has \$108,000,000 in gold, and the action of the banks will hold it where it is until relief comes from elsewhere."

"Should you meet further withdrawals in a like manner?"
"I am sure that it is so, the banks which have already acted on this policy will continue to do what they can to guard against a depletion of the treasury."

Speaking of the movement in regard to the plan: "The action of the banks is what should have been expected. The banks are as much a part of the government as are the people. But there really never has been any reason for their doing this. There is in this country fully \$55,000,000 in gold, and the country is not short of gold. It is annually. The present movement can continue but little longer, as France and Austria will soon acquire all the gold reserve of the world, and the demand from there will then probably cease."

Assistant Treasurer Roberts stated that \$2,000,000 in gold was turned over to the treasury today, which, with the \$2,000,000 received provisionally, makes \$4,000,000 received from the banks in exchange for legal tender notes. Mr. Roberts said: "The present administration will continue only so long as it is necessary to carry out the policy of the new administration, and the only step that will be taken will be to maintain a surplus over the gold reserve."

THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.
The American Minister Assumes Control of Affairs at Honolulu.
SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—The anxiously expected steamer Australia arrived off the Heads at an early hour this morning, with the news that Minister Stanford had established a protectorate over the Hawaiian islands. The act was executed at 9 o'clock on the morning of the first instant, when the stars and stripes were raised over Aliouali hall. The minister issued the following proclamation, which was published officially Feb. 1st:

"At the request of the provisional government of the Hawaiian islands, I, hereby, in the name of the United States of America, assume the protection of the Hawaiian islands, and the occupation of the public buildings and Hawaiian soil so far as may be necessary for the public peace as specified in the executive order which is attached to this proclamation. This action is taken pending and subject to the negotiations at Washington."

At the time of the departure of the Australia the indications were that there were discussions arising among the members of the executive council of the new government, and it was believed that a request had been made to the Hawaiian minister to take full control pending the decision of the United States.

The steamer brought news of the death of the youngest daughter of the American minister resident. The people of all the consulates were put at half mast.

Paul Neuman, a member of the ex-queen's cabinet, was on board the Australia on his way to Washington. In the depot the queen's case before the department. STATE AFFAIRS.

THE KANSAS RAILROAD COMMISSION REORGANIZED.

Messrs. Anthony and Mitchell to Resist the Assumption of Authority by Their Successors.

A Resolution Offered in the Republican House to Unseat the Entire Following of Speaker Danmore.

A Street Car Bill Prepared by a Populist Politician—A Measure to Prevent Counties and Towns From Voting Bonds to Aid in Building Railways—Court Screenshot Thought to be Making Too Much Money—General Notes.

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 9.—The executive council has wrestled with the question of the election of new railroad commissioners. After a great many ballots John Hall of Erie, P. K. Maxson of Emporia and W. D. Vincent of Clay Center were elected. The council adopted a resolution declaring the seats of Commissioners Anthony and Mitchell vacant. Mr. Hall was elected to take the place of Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Vincent the place of Mr. Anthony. Mr. Maxson is to succeed Mr. Green, whose term expires on April 14. The council recommended General Bradshaw of Topeka for secretary, to succeed Charles H. Elliott, and J. M. Lester as clerk, to succeed Captain Jack Downing. Commissioner Mitchell will absolutely refuse to acknowledge the legality of this election, and George T. Anthony may also make a fight.

In the Republican house this morning the committee on elections reported a resolution unseating C. M. Noble of Freedom, Butler county, and William T. Brown of Kingman county, each of them being postmasters on Jan. 18, 1893. The report declares that vacancies exist in these districts and requests the governor to call a special election to fill the vacancies. Thus, one by one the populists fall.

A resolution, by Mr. Wagner of Cherokee, giving power to the speaker to appoint the necessary number of sergeants at arms, was passed. This was looked upon by those who are always expecting work like measure to be the first step to the fring.

Senator Atchison immediately following with a resolution reciting that the house had legally organized with sixty-four members holding certificates, and that the members of the house who had been elected to the present time; that two members had been legally seated since the special election; that the house had sixty-four members who recognize the legal house; that fifty-four members had persistently refused to recognize the legal house, that they now held certificates, and that the special election was called upon to fill the seats of those who refused to recognize the legal house. The resolution was passed.

Several bills were put upon their third reading and passed. The house then adjourned until tomorrow.

In the populist house this afternoon several bills were considered. The bill providing for the whole, but few new bills were introduced. Mr. Campbell of Stafford gave notice that he would report upon the appropriation bill for the year 1893, and that he would perform their duties and for asking legitimate work. WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The inquiry into the whisky trust was continued today. Shortly after Dewar's return from St. Paul the witness met Gibson at the Grand Pacific hotel, according to agreement. Gibson was arrested and taken to the marshal's office. A bottle of the compound was found in Gibson's valise. The witness was not present at the time, but was informed that it was not an explosive, but a combination of sulphuric acid and phosphoric acid, which would produce a flame. A shot would explode the mixture, about a hole through the cylinder, release the alcohol or high proof spirit, and ignite the same, and would be used by the distiller to heat the whisky.
