

## \$10,000 A ROUND.

THE PRICE PAID FOR THE HALL-FITZSIMMONS FIGHT.

Fitz Puts His Antagonist to Sleep With a Right Header in the Fourth Round.

The Americanized Australian Decisively Proves His Claim to Be the Middle-Weight Champion of the World.

Jim Corbett Places His Money on Hall, and Comes to the Conclusion That Only Jackson or Slavin Would Stand Any Show With the Winner.

The Mill Witnessed by a Big Crowd of Sports. Ringside Scenes. Other Ring Items.

NEW ORLEANS, March 8.—The battle of the middle-weights is over, and Fitzsimmons is victor. It took but four rounds to decide the contest. The March carnival of pugilism has become prize ring history, and its record is before the country. It is important because of two things: one of its fights was for the largest purse ever fought for in a ring; the day of extravagant purses ended tonight. A magnificent crowd, in point of size and personnel, saw the great battle—the victory won, and the defeat suffered. The scene was the most superbly appointed fistic arena in the land. The men were of somewhat similar build. Both are giants—strong and big-boned and long-armed, stubborn and formidable, fighters adepts in science, experienced in the ring, and hard punchers. Each has a distinctive style; each has been regarded as a wonder.

So close was the match considered that for a long time even money was wagered on either. The east has been anxious to revenge itself on Fitzsimmons for the defeat of Jack Dempsey, and they went to Hall, not only because Hall was considered a good man, but because the other sections were in favor of the south and Hall. There was not much choice, however, and the betting was consistent during the day. Hall seemed a strong favorite, and Fitzsimmons was only lightly the choice of the talent. It was 9 to 10 on Hall at nightfall and 5 to 100 on Fitzsimmons. An influx of Fitzsimmons men and several thousands of spectators, money, appearing in the poolrooms late in the evening, beat down Hall and made Fitzsimmons the favorite. Even money was demanded for Hall and 4 to 1 on his opponent.

The men kept their rooms most of the day, going out only when necessary. The arrangements at the ringside were perfect. The seating capacity was more than ample to seat five as many people as were expected. President Noel was on the grounds before dark, and a police cordon was drawn about the building before day had been succeeded by night. The two men reached the arena in ample time to rest and to prepare themselves for the battle. Charlie Mitchell and Jack McAuliffe, with Hall, attracted as much attention when they entered the ring as the two principals. Both principals were drawn to a five-point, so far as condition was considered, but neither had taken off much flesh and they were strong. They came into the ring with promptness and the crowd did not have long to wait for hostilities to commence.

The men chosen to look after Hall's interests were the light-weight champion, McAuliffe, and John Kline holding the watch. Fitzsimmons had no special reputation, but not less faithful, than Hall's attendants—Billy Fitzsimmons, his brother and Martin Julian, and Frank Beaworth and B. M. O'Malley keeping time.

The men entered the ring at 9 o'clock promptly. Hall leading the procession. Referee Duffy took his position and immediately both he and Hall were cheered loudly. Fitzsimmons came in, waving the United States flag, and received a tremendous ovation. The referee made a neat speech, counseling the men to use fairness, and the mill commenced.

A club official, ran quickly to the prostrate pugilist, and, applying restoratives, gradually brought him back to consciousness. Fitzsimmons also ran to the center of the ring, and, pulling off his gloves, helped to resuscitate his conquered foe. When Hall had been brought to be was carried limp to his chair, where he remained until his pulse had been restored. Fitzsimmons was crowned with delight over his comparatively easy victory.

The purse was not for the middle-weight championship of the world, but it might have been, as that was involved. Fitzsimmons had whipped Dempsey, champion of America, and had won his battle with England's champion in his class, but the men tonight fought at catch weights for superiority only. The result of the battle ends Hall's chances against Fitzsimmons and Fitzsimmons is perfect in his class. The purse was \$10,000. Of that sum \$2,500 went to the loser, and the remainder to the winner.

**CHAMPION CORBETT.** KANSAS CITY, March 8.—Champion James Corbett was tendered a reception on change today by the members of the board of trade, operations being suspended for that purpose. In acknowledging the courtesy Corbett departed from the usual custom of pugilistic champions, and made no reference to himself as a fighter or as champion, or to matters of that character. The members of the board of trade will attend his performance ("Gentleman Jack") in a body this evening.

**BASEBALL.** NEW YORK, March 8.—At a meeting of the baseball leagues this afternoon the arbitration board decided that the Eastern league, having complied with the league agreement, has the right to reserve its players. This is a victory for the Eastern league.

**BLUFF CITY GOSSIP.** BLUFF CITY, Kan., March 7.—[Special Cor.]—The past ten days has brought to Harper county so much sunshine and warmth that it would seem that spring was at hand. Farmers in this vicinity are engaged in plowing and sowing oats, making gardens, hauling wheat to market, etc.

**STONE'S MISTAKE.** JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 8.—When Governor Stone recently inaugurated his senatorial boom with a message on state's rights, taking the Cass and St. Clair county bond trouble for a text, it was supposed by his friends and political advisers that he had made a great mistake. His supplemental message, however, was also supposed to be another long step toward the position which Senator Vest now holds in the national congress. But today it has been ascertained that the governor has not placed a serious obstacle in the way of his aspirations. At the time the first message was sent to the general assembly the question of a new county bond was completed, voting on a compromise of the bond issue, finally agreed upon by Judge Phillips and the county judges of Cass county, and the governor's message was accordingly a compromise with the three of the townships had not voted on the indebtedness owed by them, and the result of Governor Stone's message was to defeat a compromise which would have avoided the trouble. Pleasant Hill township refused to adopt the compromise after the people had read the governor's state's rights message, and now the bond issue is again before the assembly. Many are anxious to find some way out of the difficulty. Yesterday two or three citizens of Pleasant Hill came to see the governor. They were Judge Phillips to give the township another chance, claiming that the business men were sure that the compromise would carry.

**AN EARTHQUAKE SHOCK.** LONG ISLAND CITY, L. I., March 8.—All Long Island seems to have felt what is now supposed to have been an earthquake at 12:50 o'clock this morning. At Long Island City the shock was especially severe, in many instances shaking pictures from the walls and creating havoc among chimneys and brick-work. At several points persons fell in terror from their houses to the streets in their night robes, supposing that the houses were settling or falling.

**A HOTEL FIRE.** GARDEN CITY, Mo., March 8.—The Jacobs hotel here was discovered to be on fire this morning, and just in time to get the occupants out alive. So narrow was their escape that in reaching the outer air W. D. Jacobs, the proprietor, had his leg broken; James Cahill, waiter, his hand burnt, and Jennie Marker, an employee, was badly and nearly fatally injured. Five others received minor injuries. The building was totally destroyed, the loss is \$25,000 and the insurance \$20,000.

**THE MISSOURI RISING.** ATCHISON, Kan., March 8.—The river is rising rapidly at this point. The current has changed to the Kansas side at White Cloud. The Burlington and Missouri track is in danger, and the company will commence work at once on the road. The Missouri Pacific is also making arrangements to move its track between here and Leavenworth.
