MEMENTOS OF SHAKESPEARE.

A Jug and Cane Which Once Belonged to the Avon Bard. So lamentably few and far between are the authentic relics of Shakespeare, says a London journal, that considerable interest will be aroused in the minds of all English speaking people by the recent sale at Christie's of two apparently genuine mementos of the poet of all time. One is described as "Shakespeare's jug." It is of cream-colored earthenware, nine inches high and sixteen inches round the largest part, and is somewhat in the shape of a modern coffee pot. It is divided longitudinally into eight compartments, each horizontally subdivided; and within these subdivisions the principal deities of the heathen mythology are represented in rather bold relief. It is stated that at the beginning of the present century a silver top and edging were added, with a small dedication of the poet, inscribed "William Shakespeare at the age of forty." Accompanying the jug is a Malacca cane in beautiful preservation, four feet seven and a half inches in length. These two articles, it is declared, were bequeathed by the poet to his sister Joan, who married Mr. Hart; and the relics remained in possession of the family until the first years of the nineteenth century. No doubt an accurately verified pedigree exists of the changes of hands, if any, which these objects have under gone since they have passed out of the keeping of the Hart family or their descendants. The bidding for the two articles started at the small sum of five guineas, and the bids gradually advanced to one hundred and fifty-five guineas, at which certainly not inflated price the jug and the Malacca cane were knocked down. Assuming the trustworthiness of the pedigree, the production of which would be absolutely indispensable, it would be difficult to maintain that the jug and the stick did not belong to the Swan of Avon; and there is, besides, a tolerably strong body of extraneous evidence which might be quoted to prove that the jug, at all events, is authentic.

A WOMAN COWBOY.

She is Only Eighteen Years Old, But Has Full Charge of the Cattle. A Chamberlain (S. D.) correspondent of the St. Paul Pioneer Press tells about an interesting and picturesque character in that neighborhood. West of here, in the ceded Sioux lands, is a female cowboy, he writes. Her name is Gertrude Petan, eighteen years of age, and she formerly lived with her parents near Kimball, this county. Upon her parents moving to the ceded lands she accompanied them, and has since remained at their new home on Bull creek, Pratt county. Her father invested in about three hundred head of cattle. As her only grown brother works on an adjoining ranch, the duty devolves upon her to take care of the cattle owned by her father. She does not simply take the cattle to the range and leave them there, but remains with them all day, and takes care of them as well as could any cowboy. Her duties frequently take her from thirty to forty miles from home, as the cattle must be kept moving in order to feed well all day. Frequently some of the cattle become mired in the mud along the streams where they graze. And then comes the hardest part of her work. She must rescue the cattle from their perilous positions. This she does in the true cowboy fashion, by fastening a lariat to the horns of the mired cattle, with the other end of the rope fastened securely to the horn of her saddle. Then a strong, steady pull by her pony draws the imprisoned cattle to a place of safety on dry ground. The young lady has been named "The Lady Cowboy" by the cowboys in that section. She wears a wide-brimmed, white felt hat and long gauntlet gloves, carries a lariat coiled about the horn of her saddle, and rides the wildest broncho on the range. She has full charge of the cattle on her father's ranch.

Looking-Glasses.

The annual manufacture in Europe at the present time, according to the latest statistics, is something like 1,500,000 square yards of looking-glass. In the mirrors of to-day the light is reflected by a layer of silver or an amalgam of tin, but a proportion of the light is lost in the process of reflection, and the image is less luminous than the original. The value of a looking-glass is usually estimated by the thickness of the glass, because the thicker they are the stronger they must be; but, speaking scientifically, thick glasses are defective, because the outlines of the image reflected are less clearly defined. There are really three reflections, and, consequently, three images in every glass mirror, one from the upper surface of the glass, the second from the lower surface, and the third from the metallic layer at the back. An ideal mirror is one with a perfectly flat surface, but it is only possible to obtain this result in comparatively small glasses. The larger glasses do not reflect a true image, because it is not possible to make them quite flat.

Two Glorious Scenes Bring Out a Glow of Enthusiasm. A traveler in the heart of the Andes tells, in "Tropical America," how he relieved his feelings when, having ascended the Paramillos, he found himself at the summit, nine thousand feet above the sea level. The scenery had increased in grandeur every hour since daybreak, and now two magnificent spectacles were to be enjoyed. The first was a broad view of the Cuyo valley, southward and eastward, with Mendoza, its shaded streets, its plazas and its suburban farms and vineyards directly below and so near that with a glass streets and houses could be identified. The second was an inspiring glimpse of the main Andean chain, now suddenly towering thousands of feet above us in the west. Tupungato, in solemn majesty, looked down upon us from the clouds. Glory Hallelujah!" A flush of patriotic pride illuminated the Chilean's face, and he repeated: "Magnifico!" There we stood in rapture, gazing at the Andean kings, with their snowy emine falling from their stately shoulders.

An Instrumental Hiss. It is a tiny bellows with a whistle for a mouth-piece, which the spectator puts under his foot.

An Honest Gas Meter. The penny-in-the-slot system has been applied very successfully to gas meters in several large English cities. In its latest form the meter has three dials, marked "p.", "d.", and "c.", and no sooner has a penny been dropped into the slot than the hand of the "D" dial records it. When twelve pennies have been dropped in the "D" dial stands at "0.", while the "S" dial records that one shilling's worth of pennies are in the meter, and so on, until £30 worth of gas has been paid for. The hands can only move one way, so that the household practically gets an indisputable receipt for the money he puts into the slot, and the total amount he has paid for his gas. An indicator shows how many feet of gas are "paid for but unconsumed."

CROKER'S QUIET WAYS. The Great Politician's Unobtrusive Surprises a Visitor. Keeps an Eye on Everything and Always Knows What the Humblest Ward Worker is Doing—Thorough System of Discipline.

A gentleman who had occasion to call upon the chief of Tammany hall the other day was shown into a room in which there were a lot of politicians seated around a desk. He was surprised when the quietest and most unobtrusive-looking individual in the group was pointed out as Richard Croker.

The biggest of all New York's professional politicians is not a striking-looking man at all. He looks more like a successful turkman than the controller of the greatest political forces in American national affairs. But although Mr. Croker admires horses and has recently purchased some fine ones, the turf is only a diversion. His serious occupation in life is that of running the great Tammany machine. He has served a long apprenticeship and knows his business from the ground up. He is now nearly fifty years old and has been in active political life for thirty years. He was elected alderman when only twenty-three years old, serving several terms. He held many successive offices, finally becoming fire commissioner under Mayor Edson and being reappointed by Mayor Hewitt.

One of the unpleasant things said about Mr. Croker by his enemies is that he was at one time indicted for murder. This was in 1879, during the famous Hewitt-O'Brien congressional campaign. Croker was one of the most active supporters of Mr. Hewitt. One night there was a collision between the adherents of the two candidates, and a bystander named McKenna was killed by a pistol fired by some unknown person. As a supporter of Hewitt Alderman Croker was accused by the O'Brien followers of the murder and was arrested. He was tried and acquitted. Furthermore, a year ago last February a man named Burke called on Croker at Tammany hall, told the chief that he knew who killed McKenna, and begged his pardon for having allowed the matter to rest so long.

It has been said that the Tammany organization is held together solely by the cohesive power of public plunder. But, like many other picturesque phrases, this one is not accurate; there is much truth in it, but it is not all the truth. If Tammany relied upon public plunder alone it would soon go to pieces. Without the spoils of office it would soon cease to exist, because the main reason for its existence would be gone. But without splendid organization and competent leadership it could not live. Tammany is an army, and like other successful armies its success rests largely upon its discipline. To lead such an army Richard Croker is qualified both by nature and training. At first sight he usually impresses people as shallow, stubborn and rather dull. But as one's acquaintance progresses he is found to be both deep and dark. Cold and silent, in appearance he possesses many of the attributes which characterized Gen. Grant. He is a listener, not a talker. Stubborn, plain, practical and persistent, he at the same time excels as a tactician and organizer. His judgment of men is accurate, and he always tries to keep in touch with the masses.

The members of the great organization which he now leads stand shoulder to shoulder, breast to back, and keep step. He has them constantly under review. He is with his people all the time, notes their ins and their outs, their comings and their goings. Not a district leader of the thirty (his immediate lieutenants) but is known thoroughly. Not a ward polli watcher but feels that Croker is watching him in turn, and is fully informed concerning the manner in which he performs his local duty.

Croker is an Irishman by birth, but he has been a resident of New York city from infancy. His family was a honorable one, his grandfather having been an inspector general of the British army, an uncle a member of parliament from Cork, another uncle a
