FUSION PLAYED OUT.

BOONE AND O'BRYAN COME OUT SQUARELY FOR STRAIGHT DEMOCRACY.

One is Tired of Hobby Horses and the Other Wants to see the Democratic Party Restored—Fusion Impossible Except the Democracy Gets the Best of it.

Fusion has had its day and the both factions of the Democratic party want to come together again. One side is tired of riding hobby horses that carry them where, and the other side is of a forgiving nature and seems inclined to take the wanders back with that tenderness of feeling that characterized the parents of that ancient youth known as the prodigal son who had to feed with the swine in his day.

Mr. Boone creates the idea at least if he does not say it in that many words, that the fusionists have treated the stalwarts in a mean manner and that amends ought to be made by nominating a stalwart for the state standard bearer.

It is not necessary to say any more in this respect by way of an introductory.

The interviews of the gentlemen themselves as published in the Kansas City Times Sunday morning tell the balance of the story. The Times detailed a special correspondent to interview them and the following is the result:

"What, in your opinion, is the outlook for Democratic politics in Kansas?" was asked of Mr. Boone.

"I believe," said he, "that at the present time an important political change is quietly working itself all over the state."

"It is highly important to the Democratic party in this state that it be thoroughly organized in the next campaign, for I am satisfied that a good many of the party are past over to joining to affiliate with the moment they see that we mean business again."

"Who, in your opinion, could be nominated for governor to suit the conditions you speak of?" asked the Times correspondent.

"The logical candidate in my opinion," said he, "is David Overmeyer of Topeka. He would come nearer satisfying all the criteria of a candidate than any other Democrat in the state. He is a thorough and sincere Democrat, a man of ability and integrity, and one whom I sincerely believe would unite all the different elements and factions. He would make a formidable candidate. He would not only pull a full party vote, but he would attract support from all the other parties, and in this way he would bring strength to the party that would in all likelihood remain permanent, an one of whom you call the fusion Democrats myself, and I assure you that the differences between the fusion Democrats and the stalwarts are nothing more than a matter of degree of opinion, and I believe that while both sides are honest in their convictions about party expediency that they are now willing to come together and march forward to victory under one banner."

NEFF ACQUITTED.
After Deliberating Forty Minutes the Jury Returned a Verdict of Not Guilty.

The case of the state vs. Robert Neff was given to the jury at 5 o'clock yesterday evening, and at 5:40 they returned with a verdict of "not guilty."

Two ballots were taken, the first resulting in a tie for acquittal and three for conviction. They returned to the court after the first ballot, for the judge to interpret to them an interlineation in the instructions, which some of them did not understand.

When the case was called at 10:30 in the morning the prosecution stated that they rested their case. This was more or less of a disappointment, for it was understood when court adjourned before Sunday that two of the police commissioners at least would take the stand and give evidence.
