

GOOD FOR TOURISTS

RAILROAD TRAVEL WILL SOON BE CHEAPER THAN WALKING.

Western Passenger Association Ideas Will Put in a Rate of \$16.10 From the San Hills to the Golden Gate—A Bold Blow to the Union Pacific Which Will Prove Distressing, if Not Fatal to That System—Railway News.

CHICAGO, April 18.—The war in emigrant rates will begin in earnest next Sunday. Chairman Caldwell of the Western Passenger association today issued notice to all members of the association that with the beginning of next week the association lines will put in a rate of \$16.10 on emigrant business from the Missouri river to California. This is a cut of \$15.00, the present rate from the river to California being \$31.10. The new rate will be a bold blow to the Union Pacific, as that road's present percentage on each ticket from the Missouri river to Oregon is just \$16.10.

The Western Passenger association lines are, by this reduction, offering to carry passengers clear across the continent for the same amount as the Union Pacific demands to Oregon. The latter road, if it meets the rate, cannot afford to pay commissions, as it is as sure to lose carry passengers at a loss. And it cannot secure emigrant business without paying commissions. Its only hope, from present appearances is to draw the Southern Pacific into the fight and induce that line to reduce its commission for carrying passengers west from Oregon to California. The line making the fight against the Union Pacific, which are the Burlington, Atchison and Rock Island, profess, however, to feel easy on the subject. They claim that the Southern Pacific will hardly join in a fight in which it has no special interest. The Atchison and Rock Island have issued notices to their passengers to reduce rates from Colorado common points to Montreal and New York. They have announced a rate of \$36.25 to Montreal and \$50 to New York, the first cut being a cut of \$1.75, the second a cut of \$4.25. They claim that both the Missouri Pacific and Union Pacific have been using these rates for some time.

Duke of Coburg and his son, the czarwick, the Duke of Connaught and the Prince of Wales, who were among those who greeted the emperor upon his arrival, all wore German uniforms, and with their military staffs awaited his coming upon the platform of the railway station. The emperor wore the uniform of Queen Victoria's dragon regiment. After the military display, Emperor William was presented a splendid floral offering from the ladies of Coburg and then he proceeded to the ducal palace.

WOMAN ARRESTED FOR MURDER.

ANTWERP, April 17.—The police have arrested Mme. Jouloux, who belongs to one of the most prominent families in Antwerp. She is charged with the murder of her husband, who was killed by a bullet from a revolver.

SUED FOR HIS SON.

LONDON, April 18.—The earl of Buchan appeared before the bankruptcy court today in response to a petition of money which he held a dishonored bill for £140,000 which had been issued in the name of his second son. The earl explained to the court that his total liabilities amounted to £250,000. He stated that he was receiving £25,000 a year from the estate of his first son, to whom he had transferred his Scottish estates in 1872. The earl added that he had been threatened with litigation on the ground that the transfer was illegal.

CLOSURE IN COMMONS.

LONDON, April 18.—After a long debate in the common today John Redmond moved the closure, which was carried by a vote of 254 to 195. The result was received with pleased cheers from the Liberal and Irish benches.

ARGENTINE FINANCIAL FLURRY.

LONDON, April 18.—A dispatch to the Times from Buenos Ayres states that the Argentine government has decided to recall the want of the confidence in the immediate future among the commercial community.

FRESH EGYPTIAN DISCOVERIES.

CAIRO, Egypt, April 18.—Professor Morgan, who has been excavating in Egypt for some time past, has made a fresh and important discovery. A few weeks ago he discovered the remains of a supposed king of Egypt, and now it is announced his excavations at the foot of the brick pyramid of Darius have led to the discovery of the fourth dynasty king, Merus Hatohab. In addition the excavator found an ebony coffin and a golden mask, etc. The excavations will be continued.

SAME ALL OVER

UNCLE SAM'S BANK IS SO EMPTY HE CAN'T BUILD SHIPS.

Report of Committee on Naval Affairs Regrets that the Depleted Condition of the Treasury Won't Permit Any Present Additions to the Navy—Necessity of More Battle Ships Urged and Liberal Appropriations Asked For.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—The present and prospective naval strength of the United States, in comparison with that of foreign powers, is set forth in the report of the house committee on naval affairs, presented today by Chairman Cummings. The report states that the committee has reluctantly concluded not to recommend the construction of a new battleship, because of the depleted condition of the treasury. It is urged, however, that there must be no halt in building up the navy. England proposes, says the report, to build seven battleships of the first-class, six cruisers of the second-class and six sloops, Italy, with a rapidity necessary, is preparing to build three first-class battleships, three cruisers, twelve torpedo boats and four transports. Germany, France and Russia are going to even greater lengths to secure an increase of their navies. The report adds: "In view of these facts it certainly would not be safe for the United States to build no more battleships."

WASHINGTON, April 18.—The question of the admission of Utah as a state occupied almost the entire time of the senate committee on territories today, and when the committee adjourned it was with the understanding that the senate will report on an early day, probably at the next regular meeting of the committee next week.

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LINED WITH SILVER

CLOUDS OVERHANGING KELLYS. COUSAD: BURN BRIGHT SIDE.

Indignation of Citizens of Omaha and Council Bluffs at the Treatment Accorded the Wanderers Results in Withdrawal of Militia—Rich Gifts of Money and Food Showed Upon Kelly's Host—Other Brigades.

OMAHA, Neb., April 11.—Kelly's army camped in the Chautauque grounds tonight, as free as the soft air that gently swelled the boughs on which the tender foliage of early spring is just appearing. As Kelly himself remarked, the silver lining to his cloud had come. There was a decided revision of feeling among the people this morning. Indignation against the withdrawal of the militia and the citizens of Omaha, Council Bluffs and South Omaha set vigorously to work to ameliorate the condition of the unfortunate.

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ON DOWN GRADE

SHARE SPECULATION UNSETTLED AND PRICES DECLINE.

Industrials Open Well but an Attack on General Electric Leads to Piling All Along the Line and Shares Retreat After but Feeble Attempts to Rally—The Bond Market Also Suffers a Relapse—Stock Quotations.

NEW YORK, April 18.—The share speculation today was unsettled in character. During the morning the market was strong in tone, particularly for the industrials, in which the chief activity was displayed in the early dealing. General Electric which had been advanced 1/4 by the bull pool formed some time ago, began to show signs of weakness about the middle of the day, and was singled out for attack by the bears. The selling movement in these shares was quickly communicated to the general market and with the exception of some inconsequential rallies, the tendency during the rest of the day was downward. The lowest figures were touched just before the close, at which the decline from the highest point ranged from 1/2 to 2, the latter in General Electric, while Chicago Gas had receded 1/4, American Tobacco 1/4, Rubber 2, Rubber Plut 2/4 and Hook Lard 1/4. The stock market was generally unsettled and prices declined.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
