

TWO SETS OF BOOKS

SANTA FE REORGANIZATION COMMITTEE STRIKES A SNAG.

Expert Financier Little Announces to the Committee That in His Examination of the Books He Has Found Evidence of Fictitious Book-keeping—Books Kept in the West and East Don't Jibe—Discrepancy is Seven Million Dollars.

NEW YORK, July 21.—The World tomorrow will say: The meeting of the Atchafalaya, Tepeka and Santa Fe reorganization committee, Friday, developed an astounding surprise. It is the fact that the expert, Little, would make his financial report, which would agree with the committee's estimates, and the reorganization plan could be put forth complete in every detail.

Mr. Little, however, did not make his report as stated, but that he had examined the books he found evidence of fictitious book-keeping in the matter of rebates to freight shippers. The amount was very large, instead of being charged to the proper expense account had been shifted to other channels so that the statements of income and earnings were incorrect.

An explanation was demanded, and the fact elicited that two sets of books were kept, one in the west and one in the east. Mr. Little had evidently examined the western books. Where it was necessary the charges were properly made on the eastern books, on which public statements were issued.

REILLEY'S RAILROAD BILL

Proposition for Settling Mortgage Debts of Pacific Road.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Representative Reilly of the committee on Pacific roads, made a report to the house today on the bill to adjust the debts of the Central and Union Pacific railways. A review of the legislation affecting the roads from 1862 is given in the report. The purpose of the committee, it is explained, is not only to develop a plan that will insure the payment of the government bonds, but also to find in its operations and dissolve the complicated relations that have heretofore existed between the government and the companies.

It is said to differ from former bills in that it extends the extension or funding of the entire indebtedness, the first mortgage as well as the government bonds, and supplies the amount in the sinking fund to the credit of the companies on their indebtedness to the government. It is pointed out that the government bonds and the government bonds bear 6 percent interest which the committee believes it is not possible for the companies to meet, as it has been proposed to convert the first mortgage bonds into government bonds.

VILAS' EFFORT TO HARMONIZE THE SENATE FALLS FLAT.

Mr. Vilas was appealed to by a large number of democratic senators to give up the amendment. He refused to do so, and the senate adjourned over until Monday.

WAS A CRUEL JOKE

KICKAPOO COUNTRY IS SETTLED IN A WONDERFUL WAY.

Report Gets Abroad That the Land Had Been Thrown Open and the Law Scramble for Claims Ended. Many Settlers do Not Know Yet That It Was a Hoax. Men appear at Enid Office at Guthrie and Want to File.

T., July 21.—Over one thousand men broke their necks getting into the Kickapoo country Thursday, and today every one of them is looking around for some one to kick. They are not under the collar and the only redeeming feature of the whole business is that everybody was sold and misery has an abundance of company.

Thursday the Wichita Eagle published a Washington dispatch saying that the Kickapoo land would probably be thrown open to settlement in September. In some mysterious manner the report got abroad that President Cleveland had declared the lands open and the race was already on.

The effect was electrical. Men left their wives. They didn't stop to argue whether the report could be true or not. They yanked their tags out of the stable, slipped on blankets and saddle, dug the spurs in and flew for the promised land. Vehicles on the streets were bargained for in six seconds. Later possession of it in two seconds and in less than a minute the wagon or the buggy was out of town, with the wheels jumping over the ground like a steam roller.

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
