





TWO DECISIONS. Colorado Mine Arbitration and Missouri River Bridge Cases Passed on.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10.—In the United States court of appeals today opinions were handed down in two important cases. In the case of Samuel H. Nolan, Stephen W. Kearney and Louis Rockwell, against the Colorado Central Consolidated Mining company, appealed from Colorado, Judge Thayer delivered the opinion which directed that the order vacating the award of arbitrators be not disturbed, but that the judgment dismissing the plaintiff suit be reversed and be remanded. The plaintiffs sued for \$100,000 for alleged entry of a mine by defendant and claimed by plaintiffs. By agreement these arbitrators were appointed to receive the hearing in progress, the defendant then agreed to arbitration, but the court would not admit the right to revoke the agreement and the arbitrators returned a judgment against the defendant for \$2,500.00. The trial court set aside this award and dismissed the plaintiffs suit.
