To Prevent Frost Windows.  
 All of us know what a nuisance a stream of frost covered window is in cold weather. A very thin coat of sapolio applied to both sides of the glass will prevent any moisture forming thereon and will stay until it collects so much dust that it cannot be seen through. For this reason it should be put on very thin. Sapolio may be used on their instruments in foggy weather, and there is no film to obstruct the sight. In fact, it can be used anywhere to prevent moisture from forming on a surface.
