CAME OUT ON TOP

CRIMINAL CASE AGAINST T. R. HAZZARD KNOCKED OUT.

Not Sufficient Evidence Produced to Bind Him Over—Daniel Wren Testifies in His Favor Although He Swore to a Damaging Deposition Herebefore—Wren Said He Was Mistaken When He Swore to the Deposition But He Was Pardoned From the Pen on the Strength of Hazzard's Time Now.

Yesterday the state made a complete failure in the case against T. R. Hazzard who was acquitted at his preliminary hearing. There was no evidence given that would justify Justice Jones in binding him over and the county went to thousands of dollars expense in the case, all for nothing.

Hazzard has been a very much abused man or else there has been something very rotten in Denmark. He was charged with various acts of crookedness and was alleged to be one of the chief men in the gang that traded off so many worthless or forged securities to eastern men for horses and for which event Daniel Wren was sent to the penitentiary.

County Attorney Boone a long time ago had a warrant issued for him and put it in the hands of constable George Green. The latter made two trips after him at an enormous expense to the county and finally brought him back on a requisition, from Vermont. Sankey & Campbell were in with County Attorney Boone in the case.

Daniel Wren while in the penitentiary made depositions which seriously involved Hazzard and more for the purpose of testifying against him on the stand than anything else Wren was pardoned from the penitentiary, but when he got on the stand in the court he went back on his deposition, said he was mistaken and gave testimony in favor of Hazzard and not against him. This testimony completely exonerated Mr. Hazzard and he is released from the grave charges that were against him.

It is now Mr. Hazzard's time to make charges and something sensational may be expected from him in a day or two.
