Judge Strang in speaking of the statement in the Eagle the other day that Oklahoma divorcees were bigamists, on account of a recent decision of the supreme court, says that a late act of the legislature fixes them all right and that they are not bigamists. He quoted the law as follows:

Chapter 22—An act to legalize divorces heretofore granted in the probate courts.

Be it enacted by the legislative assembly of the Territory of Oklahoma, Sec. 2.—That all decrees of divorces heretofore granted by the probate court of the various counties in this territory prior to the passage of this act, and the same are hereby declared legal, and the acts of said courts in the hearing of said divorces and in the rendering of judgment and decrees thereon, and all the orders of said courts in said divorces, whether temporary or final, are hereby ratified and declared valid in all respects.

Sec. 3.—This act shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.
