

CAN'T RUN WITHOUT

NORTHWESTERN BREEDERS SAY IT'S BETTING OR NO RACE

They have Lost Money, but have Gained Right on the Races—Nothing Declared or After the Entry Money is Accepted—Willis P. Finishes Winner—Stables Started for Fleetwood Park at St. Louis—Mile Novice Missouri State Record Broken—Sporting Notes

Chicago, Aug. 24.—The meeting of the Northwestern Breeders association closed today, the track being in fair condition. Probably \$12,000 was lost on the meeting and it is considered proof without betting cannot be conducted.

Willis P. the green Chicago gelding won the concluding heats of the 2300 trot. Al Kempland gave Dentine his first heat in the 2:22 trot. Dempsey won the 2:17 pace easily after laying up the first heat.

Spinaway won the first two heats in the 2:20 trot, but then third and Valley Queen took two heats. It was 7:15 o'clock and the owners agreed to divide first and second money.

The stables of Memphis, Salsbury, Collier, Colonel Taylor, Ed Ayres, owner of Benetta, and others shipped to Fleetwood park tonight. Summaries:

In the 2:20 trot, Willis P. won second and third heats. Time 2:16 1/2, 2:24 1/2, 2:30 1/2. Turquoise was second and Rosina third. Fry Toll won first heat in 2:17 but was drawn in third heat. Frederick L. Hawthorn, Judge Rice and Royana also started.

In the 2:22 trot, purse \$1,000. Dentine won second, third and fourth heats. Time 2:18 1/2, 2:17 1/2, 2:19 1/2. Loretta won first heat in 2:13 and was second. Glenmore third. Paul and Carrie McGregor, Jim Smith and Kittle B. also started.

In the 2:17 pace, purse \$1,000. Dempsey won second, third and fourth heats. Time 2:14 1/2, 2:16 1/2, 2:18 1/2. Brinoda won first heat in 2:15 and was second. Cuckoo was third. Hal Crapo, Ed Dezent, Chas. Conroy, Paul and Carrie Onward, Joe Nelson and Nellie R. also started.

Lakeland stables, 227 class trotting, purse \$2,000. Valley Queen won third and fourth heats in 2:24 and 2:25 1/2 and was second in first and second heats. Spinaway won first and second heats in 2:18 1/2 and 2:19 1/2. Patsy Clark won second in third and fourth heats.

Galesburg Races. Galesburg, Ill., Aug. 24.—Results at Galesburg: In the 2:22 pace, Bacillus won in straight heats. Time 2:17, 2:19 1/2. Whimperine, Hydrogen, Ira B. Gus Tupper, Lotie Harriet and Roscoe also started.

Eagle Horse Notes. Star Pointer, 2:08 1/2, is the fourth of Brown Hal's get to enter the 2:10 knot and Brown Hal, Jr., 2:10 1/2, is knocking at the door.

C. J. Hamlin has sold his grand pacing gelding Hal Pointer to R. D. Peck of Look Haven, Pa. The price is said to be \$2,500.

An inaugural horse show will be held at Kansas City on Sept. 3 to 6, and a prize list which foots up to \$3,200 has been issued.

Ben D., 2:06 1/2, has strain of the Hal blood in his dam and his dam was sired by Tom Hal, Jr., and his second dam by Kittrell's Hal.

B. N. P., William Penn, Maud C., Miss Nelson, Klamath, Beuzetta, Aunt Deilah and Jean B. are entered in the 2:13 class at Galesburg.

The 2-year-old pacing colt, Sulphide, 2:12 1/2, seems to be a faster and better-balanced colt than his brother, Carbonate, 2:08, was at the same age.

When Diablo beat W. Wood at Sacramento he paced the first half of the first heat in 1:51 1/2, second quarter in 2:04 and finished in a jog in 2:18.

The Russian, owned by the czar of Russia to the late Senator Stanford are doing well at Palo Alto, and a number of colts have been raised.

Queen McGregor, 2:08 1/2, the champion pacing mare over a mile track goes in hobbles, although she wears them very loose and very high on her legs.

Beuzetta, 2:06 1/2, will be campaigned over the first western tracks for the balance of the season, and is pretty sure to beat Director's 4-year-old record of 2:04 1/2.

The fast 3-year-old pacer, Harry R., 2:01, fell dead at Danville, Ky., last night. He was owned by W. C. Hartford of Boston, and was much faster than his sire.

White, as a rule, medium-sized or smaller than the best race horses there are exceptions. Azote, 2:06 1/2, Joe Patchen, 2:04 and Fantasy, 2:05, are all large horses.

Bumps, record 2:04 1/2, made at Buffalo, is now the fastest standard pacer of 1885. He is a bay gelding, by Baron Wilkes, 2:18, dam Queen Ethel, by Strathmore.

Alonzo, 2:17 1/2, by Alcantara, has been sold by J. W. Knox of New York to George Brown (son of the late S. A. Brown) of the Kalamazoo (Mich.) Farm, for \$4,000.

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
