LOW RECORD MADE

BALTIMORE AND OHIO GOES TO FIFTEEN AND A HALF.
Shares of This Troubled System Attract Greatest Attention and Score Their Lowest Ever Made, Declining Four Points to 15-1/2—Railways and Industrials Divide the Trading—Tobacco Plays a Star Part and Nets a Point Off—London on Both Sides of the Market—Governments Active and Higher.
New York, March 5.—The stock market today fell about 20,000 shares below Wednesday's record and business was about evenly divided between the railway shares and industrials. In the first class, Baltimore and Ohio, though not ranking first in point of activity, attracted the greatest attention, on account of exceptional weakness. The total of the transactions was fairly large. Anticipation of radical treatment of the securities in any scheme of rehabilitation of the property, caused renewed extensive liquidation of the stock, resulting in an extreme decline of 4 per cent, to 15 1/2 per cent, the lowest point on record.

THEY TALK PRETTY

MISS BARTON FINDS THE TURKS REAL PLEASANT PEOPLE.
She Describes the Interview With the Sublime Porte, in the Person of the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Who Offers Every Facility for the Passage of the Red Cross People Through the Turkish Domains, With Every Safeguard Against Danger of Molestation—Cold Comfort in Store for the Party.
New York, March 5.—A letter just received by a member of the American Red Cross association from Miss Clara Barton, dated Paris, Constantinople, February 18, tells of the journey of the Red Cross party, which sailed from here January 22, and also contains the following: "The cablegram sent by Minister Terrell yesterday afternoon to Secretary Olney with reference to the proposed passage of the Red Cross party through the Turkish domains, has been the outcome of a call in the morning upon the Sublime Porte, in the person of its minister of foreign affairs, which was in every way agreeable, cordial and satisfactory as it could have been made in any country. No only was the fullest permission given for our entrance into Armenia, but an active and generous effort was displayed toward making our endeavors, our journeys, easy, safe, pleasant and as easy as possible and also as productive of beneficial results as could be wished."

TRAPPING PARK DEER.

Three of the Deer Will Be Killed.
Capt. Cassell, superintendent of Deer Hill park, says that Mr. F. H. Toole, of Trenton, N. J., who has secured a license to hunt for deer in the park, will have to wait until there is a snowfall in February which will cover the ground, as the deer at the park cannot be trapped except when there is snow enough to hide the grass and herbs they usually feed upon. At other times their hunger does not compel them to seek the bait in the traps. The traps are set to be captured. Whenever deer are to be captured, the traps are erected by a snowfall. A pen of boards is built 12 feet high, back of which there is a door leading to a small hut. The pen must be at least 10 feet high, as deer are known to jump over fences. On the floor of the hut are arranged triggers which, as soon as the hungry animal finds his captivity, will fall by an easy spring, and the deer is caught in one pen in a single night. That way getting into the trap before the deer happens to touch a trigger. The pen is used to extract deer, as they might be afraid to enter a hut. "There is no use trying to catch deer except when it snows," said Capt. Cassell. "For several days we have had a pen or two of deer dumped behind the fence, but they would not come out, but they will not go near it when they see the grass. Mr. Toole wants two deer and a buck, but he cannot have a buck, as we cannot spare one. There are now in the park but three bucks with horns, which means three over 18 months old. There are some younger ones, but the greatest majority of the deer are does. Every autumn we shoot a number of the horned bucks to keep them from mutilating the young ones with their horns. Last fall we shot 26. There is one which we have spared for several years, and he has now a beautiful set of branching antlers, adding a branch every year. "In the park at present there are 123 deer. The deer in the park have in different parts of the park, from 35 to 50 usually going in a herd."—Baltimore Sun.
