AN IRRIGATION SCHEME

Company Formed to Use the Water in the Cheyenne Bottoms.

A great inland sea is being projected near Great Bend by an enterprise company of citizens of Kansas and Colorado.

The promoters propose to turn the Arkansas river into what is known as the "Cheyenne Bottoms," thereby creating a lake about ten by twenty-five miles in extent, to be used as a reservoir for irrigation purposes.


